

## FAILS TO SECURE CITY PRINTING

Efforts of A. S. Bliton to secure the city printing at Tuesday night's session of the council met defeat, when the report of the finance committee recommending no change in present arrangement was adopted by a vote of 3 to 1, Welch, Emerick and Eifert voting aye, and Merrick no.

It developed during the discussion that the city was paying the same price as paid Mr. Bliton last year and Mr. Bliton admitted that when he had the printing he considered it a fair price. The report of the committee read as follows:

"We, the finance committee, beg leave to file herewith our report in reply to the enclosed letter of Mr. A. S. Bliton in regard to the city printing.

"On January 19 at our regular meeting the following motion was passed, of which the following is an exact copy:

"Moved by Eifert and seconded by Demmer that the Medford Daily Tribune be made the official paper of the city for the ensuing year at the same price for printing, etc., as formerly charged, and that all the city officers be instructed to place all the city printing, etc., with said paper." On roll call the vote was as follows: Welch, Emerick, Eifert and Demmer voted aye; Wortman and Merrick voted no. Motion carried and so ordered.

"We, the finance committee, therefore see no reason why any change should be made at this time, providing the above is fully complied with.

The attorneys also introduced evidence showing that the government does not spend a great deal of money on national parks until they are made necessary. Since the creation of the Crater Lake national park the government has expended the following sums on the different parks: Yellowstone, \$1,171,840; Yosemite, \$119,130; Mount Rainier, \$108,500; Crater Lake, \$23,315.

W. P. Lord Jr. and W. D. Fenton each lent their aid to the defense, and Attorney General Crawford appeared as a friend of the court.

## TAFT RECOMMENDS AN INCOME TAX

WASHINGTON, June 16.—Taft today sent to congress a special message recommending the adoption of a joint resolution by two-thirds of both houses proposing to the states an amendment to the constitution granting the government the right to levy and collect an income tax. He also recommends as a part of the pending tariff bill an excise tax upon all corporations amounting to 2 per cent on net incomes.

The message refers to Taft's previous suggestion that if it is impossible to secure a sufficient income by import duties that new kinds of taxation be adopted. Among those suggested is an inheritance tax. Taft says the government is deprived of the power it should have and that mature consideration satisfies him that the constitutional amendment is the only proper course for the establishment of this power to the fullest extent.

purpose as aforesaid, when done in accordance with the ordinances of the city of Medford.

"Section 3—When the grantees, their successors or assigns, shall disturb any of the streets, the same shall be replaced or repaired according to the ordinances of said city.

"Section 4—The grantees, their heirs, successors or assigns, shall at the time of construction comply with the ordinances and rules of the city governing and regulating the same.

"Section 5—Nothing in this ordinance shall be so construed as to prevent the proper authorities of said city of Medford from sewerage, grading, paving or repaving any of the streets, alleys, avenues and highways on which said grantees, their heirs, successors or assigns are operating on.

"Section 6—The said grantees shall raise, lower or otherwise remove or change their appliances as to admit of buildings freely passing when being moved on any of the streets, alleys, avenues and highways in the city of Medford (within 36 hours after notice from said city).

"Section 7—The Medford Light, Heat & Power Co. will furnish free to the city of Medford the required amount of electric current to light the present city park, the city hall, and the city fire department headquarters building, one are light (900 e. p.) in front of the city hall, to be located by the proper authorities.

"Section 8—The said grantees agree to begin work on said plant, as is herein mentioned, on or before one year from the passage and taking effect of this ordinance.

"Section 9—This franchise shall be in effect for 10 years after its passage and approval.

"Section 10—The grantees shall file written acceptance of this ordinance within 10 days after approval.

"Section 11—This ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after its passage and approval."

### Original Franchise.

Section 17 of the franchise reads as follows: "This franchise is not to be transferred either directly or indirectly to the American Bell Telephone company or any subsidiary company thereof, or to any telephone company doing a competitive telephone business."

Section 19 reads: "Said grantee agrees that it will, at all times, and upon reasonable terms, permit any company, association, person or persons, operating or owning a telephone system or line without the city of Medford to make connections with its said telephone system, and that it will afford such company, association, person or persons connection with its subscribers in the city of Medford."
