VOTE ON EXTENSION OF LIMITS JULY 16

Council Accepts Petitions Extending City Limits and Orders Special Election.

Petitions to extend the city limits so that they will include considerable territory on the east side were presented to the city council Tuesday evening and accepted by that body, who ordered a special election for July 16, at which time the matter will be voted upon by the citizens of Medford and the residents of the sections to come into the city. According to the state law, the question must carry both in the city and in the territory it is proposed to annex. The Medford fire company were granted the right to sell street concessions on the day of the celebration of July 4, which will be on Monday, the 5th. The water main petitions were received and referred to the proper committee. One was for a four-inch water main on South Elm street to the Highland Park addition in West Medford and the other for the extension of the Eleventh street main south on Peach street to the city limits.

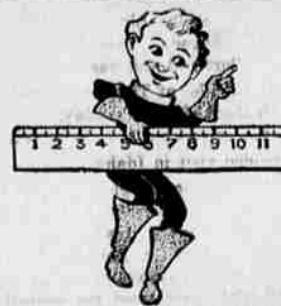
