PORKERS BRING HIGHEST PRICE IN 26 YEARS

CHICAGO, June 17.—The highest June price for live hogs since 1882 was established at the United stockyards recently, when the best porkers sold at \$8 a 100 pounds. The prevailing high prices are due to unusually light receipts of live hogs this spring at all western packing centers. Receipts of hogs today at the nine leading markets of the west were 20,000 head less than for the corresponding day last week. As a result of the scarcity of hogs, the price of provisions is now the highest for many years.

WHAT RAILROAD TIES COST THE RAILROADS

WASHINGTON, June 17.—During the year 1908 the steam and electric railroads of the United States purchased more than 112,000,000 cross ties, costing, at the point of purchase, over \$30,000,000, an average of 50 cents per tie, according to statistics just made public by the bureau of the census in co-operation

with the United States forest service. This was some 40,000,000 ties less than the quantity purchased in 1907, when the total was approximately 153,700,000, the highest ever recorded. The decreased purchases in 1908 were, of course, chiefly due to the business depression which affected every line of industry. This forced most of the roads to purchase only the ties which were absolutely essential for renewals, and heavily cut down the purchase for new track. In 1908 only 7,431,000 cross ties were reported as purchased for new track, as against 23,557,000 in 1907. Of the total number of ties purchased for all purposes, the steam roads took approximately 94 per cent, leaving about 6 per cent for the electric roads.

TO TURN SCHOOLS INTO SOCIAL SETTLEMENTS

CHICAGO, June 17.—Every public school building in this city will blossom into a social settlement this fall, if a plan now being considered by the board of superintendents is

put into effect. The scheme involves turning each building into a neighborhood center to be used by mothers' councils, parents' associations and the like. The superintendents have considered the plan, investigating practically similar experiments being carried on in Cleveland, and have prepared a preliminary report which strongly favors the innovation for Chicago.
