FRUIT GROWING IN NORTHWEST

Interesting Figures Compiled Show-
ing Tremendous Acreage Planted
Throughout Northwest.

August Wolf of Spokane, director
of publicity of the Spokane Chamber
of Commerce, has been investigating
the fruit industry in the northwest,
and predicts that by 1912 the aggre-
gated crop will have a market value
of fully \$90,000. Referring to the
demand for western apples in the
eastern market, Mr. Wolf says:

"For reasons that have never been
satisfactorily explained, the apple in-
dustry has been decreasing rapidly
in the districts east of the Rocky
mountains since 1895, and if it were
not for the great activity of the
growers and the opening of thou-
sands of acres of orchard lands in
the western country, the people of
the United States would be obliged
to import the king of fruits. As it is,
the entire crop for domestic purposes
last year was only 25,000,000 barrels
or a little more than a peck per cap-
ita of the population of the United
States.

"To show the decreases in the
production of apples in the union in
the last 12 years, these statistics,
compiled by the federal department
of agriculture, are quoted:

"Growers produced 60,540,000
barrels in 1905, and 60,070,000 bar-
rels in 1896, the banner year in the
history of the country. There was a
decrease of nearly 28,000,000 barrels
or more than the entire crop of 1897,
when the yield amounted to 41,-
536,000 barrels. Another decrease
followed in 1898, the yield being
placed at 23,570,000 barrels, but in
1899 and 1900 there were substantial
increases, placed at 37,560,000 and
47,960,000 barrels, respectively.

"There was a drop of 20,890,000
barrels in 1901, while in 1902 there
was an increase of 20,655,000 barrels,
the crop being estimated at 47,625,-
000 barrels. Forty-five million bar-
rels of fruit were produced in 1903,
and in 1904 the yield was 300,000
barrels greater. Then in 1905 it
dropped to 23,500,000 barrels, and
in 1906 it increased to 30,130,000
barrels. The crop of 1907 fell off
to 25,000,000 barrels, which was the
estimated yield for 1908. The total
yield for the 13 years amounts to
559,741,000 barrels, or 1,679,283,000
bushels."

AUTOMOBILES BARRED FROM GEORGIA TOWN

ROME, Ga., June 17.—The little
town of Seney, near here, has de-
clared war on automobiles. At a
meeting of the town council recently,
after a spirited discussion, an ordi-
nance was adopted prohibiting the
use of automobiles within the city
limits, and the town marshal was
authorized to arrest any one passing
through Seney with "such engines of
destruction."

This is said to be the first town
on record to declare war against the
automobiles in toto.

MONTAGUE MUST PAY FOR QUARANTINE OF BOY

MONTAGUE, June 17.—As a re-
sult of incorporation the town of
Montague was called upon this week
to pay the sum of \$113 on account
of the care and quarantine of Roy
Smith, who while at the Royal Hotel
in this town was taken with small-
pox. Smith was taken to a shack,
which was moved out of the town
limits and he was cared for by the
physician. The quarantine was set

April 25. Smith fully recovered and
is now employed at Pokegama. The
town authorities thought that the
county ought to bear part of the ex-
pense, at least for the doctor's fees,
since Smith was unable to pay, but
they have been advised by Attorney
Collier of Yreka, that under the sta-
tutes an incorporated town is alone
liable in such a case. The bills are
therefore being paid and smallpox
is regarded as an expensive luxury
in Montague.
