MODLE FISH SCREEN MADE BY AITKEN

Is Rotary Contrivance Which Effectually Prevents Fish From Entering Canals.

To a Jackson county investor, J. H. Aitken of Woodville, belongs the honor of inventing the only satisfactory rotary screen to prevent fish from entering irrigating canals, yet devised. According to Master Fish Warden H. C. McAllister, this is the only satisfactory contrivance in successful operation. Models of 25 or 30 fish screens are shown in the government exhibit at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition. None of them, however, compare with that invented by Mr. Aitken, which not only keeps fish out of the ditches, but prevents clogging by debris.

The wheel is simplicity itself. A common water wheel, turned by the current, turns a sprocket wheel, by chain revolves the rotary cylindrical screen in the opposite direction from the water wheel, dumping the debris into the ditch, where the current carries it off.

The ordinary rotary screen is worked by the current and revolves against it, and the debris accumulates in front of it. Mr. Aitken's wheel turns in the same direction as the current.
