SEATTLE, June 22.—An average of twenty-five thousand visitors a day have gone through the turnstiles of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition since the opening day on June first.

Up to Thursday, June 17, the total attendance had reached the 400,000 mark, a number equivalent to one-third of the population of the state.

MORE VALUABLE THAN OIL

Strange Discovery of Substance That Makes Plant Life Attain Marvelous Growth.

Theodore de Saussure, a brilliant French investigator and scientist, has added another remarkable page to the history of science in the discovery of an ash ingredient which will doubtless revolutionize and intensify all methods of horticulture and agriculture.

The constituents of the plant that it derives from the soil are nitrogen, phosphorus, sulphur, potassium, sodium, calcium, magnesium, iron, aluminum, manganese, silicon, chlorine. Of these nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium are the substances most likely to be deficient in the soil.

Although de Saussure's discovery was made nearly a century ago, these remarkable facts are not generally known, and the average agriculturist has no knowledge of the ingredients contained in the soil he attempts to cultivate.

An analysis of the soil of the Queen Anne addition shows it to be abundantly supplied with all of the phosphates that make for perfect plant life. LONDON, June 22.—Raven Cody, advertising himself as a son of Buffalo Bill, fatally shot Alice Seymour, a girl who was appearing with him in a sketch entitled "The Cowboy Gentleman," at Newbury, Berkshire. It is understood to have been accidental.

According to one version the accident occurred while Cody, who gives exhibitions in trick rifle shooting, was cleaning his rifle after the performance. Another says it happened in their lodgings.

LEWISTON, Idaho, June 22.—The cutting of the Wild Rose ledge of free gold ore at a depth of 557 feet in the Pierce City district promises to bring about a stampede not surpassed since the palmy days of the Pierce camp, when men with pickets took from the ground hundreds of dollars a day. Following the early days of plaver mining the camp passed through a lethargic stage of several years, and it was only the discovery of rich free gold-bearing quartz that again brought the attention of the mining world to the pioneer gold camp of the Pacific northwest.
