

NOT SENTIMENTAL SAYS THE JOURNAL

Differs From Judge Galloway When
He States That Crater Project
Is One of Sentiment.

The decision of Judge Galloway in the Crater Lake road case is commented upon as follows in the Oregon Journal:

"As announced by Judge Galloway, the constitution of Oregon prohibits legislative aid for the Crater Lake road, and a permanent injunction issues against disbursement of the appropriation. The possibility is that Judge Galloway is mistaken in what is the law. It is human to err, and even learned judges sometimes disagree. At least, in some points of his decision, a large part of the public will disagree with Judge Galloway. He characterizes the Crater Lake project as 'sentimental.' Many persons of large horizon would call it 'business.' If some thousands of people annually should be attracted to Oregon, as they would be, by making Crater Lake accessible, that would not be 'sentimental,' but 'business.' If these visitors, impressed by Oregon's advantages, bought lands, homes and appliances and began to add to the state's wealth and importance, as they would, that would be 'business.' As a matter of fact, there is no more sentiment in the Crater Lake project than in a cash register, and in denominating it as 'sentimental,' Judge Galloway is mistaken. The United States government is not 'sentimental.' It is a cold, calculating business establishment. It has spent over \$30,000 on the Crater Lake project, a fact that not only fixes the Crater Lake conception as a practical business enterprise, but gives to it the additional distinction of belonging not to Jackson, or Klamath county, or even to Oregon, but to the country.

"Judge Galloway holds the appropriation to be local and 'special,' and cites the Maxwell-Fillmore road case as proof. To a judicial mind there may be points of resemblance, but to the layman the Crater Lake conception with its plan of capitalizing one of the most famous natural wonders of the world for the benefit of all Oregon is as widely different from the Tillamook case as one pole is remote from the other. There are a thousand little roads

along the seashore. There is but one Crater Lake.

"In support of his view Judge Galloway cites The Dalles and Sandy wagon road case in which the court said: 'The general principle to be deduced from all the authorities seems to be this: that whenever an act of the legislature authorizes any public road or internal improvement to be made, or other act to be done, which in its nature is more beneficial to the community at large than to the inhabitants in the immediate locality of the road, or other internal improvements, such act is to be considered a public and not a special or local law.' In this decision lies the full warrant, in the view of a layman, for the Crater Lake appropriation. The benefit is for the community at large, to wit, all the people of Oregon. The Lewis and Clark fair was held in Portland, but the purpose was to attract visitors to Oregon who would be pleased and settle in the state. The late legislature proposed to make Crater Lake a perpetual Lewis and Clark fair, by its bounty as a wonder picture to draw people here to see, be pleased and settle. The principle in the two is exactly the same, and on a showing of fact rather than law, if the act was constitutional, so is the other."

EASTERN MAN SAYS THAT CHAMBERLAIN IS POPULAR

An ordinance providing for the construction of a lateral sewer along Riverside avenue from end of present sewer in said avenue at its intersection with Ninth street southwesterly for a distance of 350 feet in the City of Medford, Oregon, and for the assessment of the cost thereof on adjacent property and providing a meeting of the council to consider protests against said construction and assessment and the serving of the owners of adjacent property with notice thereof.

The City of Medford doth ordain as follows:

Section 1. It is the intention of the council to cause a six-inch lateral sewer to be constructed along Riverside avenue from the end of the present sewer in said avenue at its intersection with Ninth street southwesterly a distance of 350 feet, in the City of Medford, Oregon, and to assess the cost thereof upon the property adjacent to said portion of said street in proportion to its frontage thereon.

Section 2. The council will hear and consider any protests against said construction and the assessing of said property for the cost thereof at a meeting of the council to be held July 6th, 1909, at 8 o'clock, P. M., in the council chamber in said city, and all property owners of adjacent property are hereby called upon to appear before said council at said time and place and show cause, if any they have why such construction should not be made and the cost thereof so assessed.

Section 3. The City Recorder is hereby directed to serve notice thereof upon the property owners aforesaid, by posting three copies of this ordinance in three public places in said city and publishing this ordinance once in a daily newspaper published and of general circulation in said city at least ten days before the date of said meeting.
