WORKING HARD KLAMATH ROADS

Klamath Falls Reaching After Trade
of Lake County—Much Road
Work Under Way.

KLAMATH FALLS, June 2.—In an effort to bring the traffic of Lake county via Klamath a large sum of money has already been expended on the improvement of the roads. The county invested heavily in modern machinery and for several months has employed a large force of workmen. With the development of the interior country the demand for better roads becomes imperative. The arrival of the railroad in this city has made it possible to haul freight to most of the points of Lake county in less time than is required on the old routes. The one stumbling block to making Klamath Falls the immediate distributing center is the fact that the roads leading to the interior are not in condition for freighting.

Extensive improvements have been made on the Lakeview-Klamath Falls road, with the result that large shipments of freight are arriving here daily for Lake county merchants. Extreme Northern Klamath county and Northern Lake county are so situated that it would be cheaper to haul freight from Klamath Falls than from Alturas and Saniko, but the poor roads make it impossible to haul from this city. It is more than 100 miles to the north end of Klamath county and as the country has been but sparsely settled, it has never warranted the construction of roads suitable for freighting. The influx of settlers will make it both necessary and profitable to have the roads built. The county court is awake to the existing conditions and the result is that the campaign for better highways will be continued and all the available funds will be expended during the working season.

10,000,000 FEET LUMBER ON FORTY-SEVEN ACRES

PORTLAND, June 2.—What is probably the heaviest stand of merchantable timber in the world, or, at least, the heaviest that appears from any cruises available, is embraced in a portion of the right of way of the P. R. & N., the "Lytle road," to Tillamook. The tract is 47 acres in area, is located in township 3 north, range 6 west, Willamette meridian, Tillamook county, and on these 47 acres there are 10,403,930 feet of standing timber, mostly fir. This is less than one-third of a quarter section, and cruises 221,360 feet to the acre, or 35,417,600 feet to the quarter section.

According to the best information to be had, it is an extraordinary quarter section that will cruise even 15,000,000. The 47 acres referred to is a part of that extensive timber belt in Tillamook county which it is said cruises upward of 28,000,000.

This vast bulk of timber is almost inconceivable, for on each acre in this strip of right of way there is timber enough, if worked into lumber, to build about 14 six-room cottages. In other words, if the 47 acres were platted and divided into 14 lots to the block, every lot could have a home built on of timber standing on the lot.

PRESIDENT TAFT CEASES TO WORK AS AT FIRST

WASHINGTON, June 24.—President Taft has ceased to be the "glutton for work" that he was when he first entered office.

The chief reason is that the work at his office has dwindled until there is practically none to do, and the good-natured chief magistrate is obliged to spend the better time of his forenoons at golf or some other recreation, or die of ennui.

Never in the history of three administrations has there been as little "doing" at the White House during a congressional session as at present. When President McKinley called congress in an extraordinary session for the purpose of revising the tariff, all the schedules had to be remade and every minute was a busy one for the statesmen. At no time during President Roosevelt's seven years was there any period of rest from activity. No member of congress hoped to secure the passage of a bill without the administration's sanction, so the White House was besieged from session's beginning to session's end.

Now, of course, there are no bills going through the millstones. Thousands are being introduced in a profuse way, but they die a-borning and even the members and senators who introduce them for hopeful constituents, realize the futility of bothering their heads about their fate and consequently do not trouble Mr. Taft about them at all.

PROHIBITION WAVE IS RISING IN KENTUCKY

LOUISVILLE, Ky., June 2.—Resolutions were passed last night by Louisville commercial organizations promoting the interests of prohibition. Hundreds of telegrams throughout the state were received supporting them in the movement, and it is expected as a result a more vigorous campaign will be carried on in all counties throughout the state.

\$401,781,000 HELD BY CHICAGO NATIONAL BANKS

CHICAGO, June 2.—Deposits at the national banks of this city are at about the highest point they have ever reached. The statements published to show their condition at the close of business June 23, in response to a call from the controller of the currency, show a total of \$401,781,000 deposits in the 15 local institutions. This amount is nearly \$15,400,000 larger than the aggregate deposits of the same banks at the time of the last call.

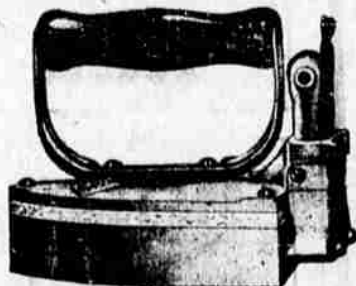
