HOUSE ON PAGE RANCH IS BURNED

Defective Flue Causes Fire, Which Completely Wipes Out Dwelling Near Talent.

The farmhouse on Dr. F. C. Page's place near Talent was entirely destroyed by fire, which started from a defective flue, Sunday evening. The house was occupied by the foreman of the ranch and his family. The contents of the house were saved for the greater part. The loss will amount to about \$1500, which is partially covered by insurance.

There was some danger at first of losing the barns, but the flames were checked before they reached them. The house has stood on the place for over 30 years.

KELSA AND ROSEBURG GET INTO TROUBLE

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 28.—Frank C. Kelsay of Portland, awarded the engineering contract for street paving in this city several months ago, has resigned, information to that effect having been received today. He says that the city has violated its contract in many instances and that he believed it could continue to do so.

The council, on the other hand, says that Kelsay is responsible for the breach, inasmuch as he has visited Roseburg but three times since securing the contract. It was understood that he would superintend the work personally, but this he failed to do. An effort is now being made to declare his \$300 bond forfeited.
