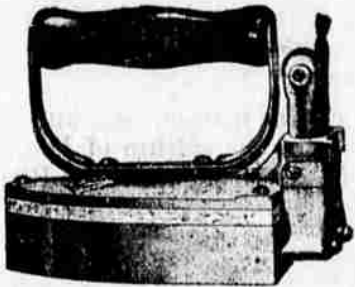

BOOKLET TELLS OF OREGON OUTINGS

Southern Pacific Issues Handsome
Pamphlets Dealing With Vacation Trips.

"Outings in Oregon" is a most attractive booklet, containing a view of Crater Lake in three colors, on the title page, has been issued by the Southern Pacific. It is, as its name implies, a description of outing resorts in Oregon.

Under the caption "Medford Outings" is given the following:

Fly Casting in Rogue River

From Oregon's earliest history visitors have praised the Rogue River valley in prose and verse, in speech and story. Perhaps the answer made by Bishop Joyce to a question propounded at a dinner party in London, "What to you is the prettiest spot in the world?" when he replied, "The Rogue River valley as seen from the Siskiyou in the spring"—is as perfect a commentary as one could wish. The valley opens out in a breadth comparable to the Willamette, though the general elevation is higher. Medford, beautifully located in this magnificent valley, is a town of new growth, modern in all that spells progress and ambitious in all that means improvement. There is a sunny warmth and glow in the atmosphere, but even in midsummer days the altitude forestalls the possibility of enervating heat. The fertile farms about Medford provide the most delightful country sojournings. The Rogue and Applegate rivers, Table Rock and the springs near by invite to picnics and jaunts of a day's duration while by stage or private conveyance you can make pleasant journeys to the lake region eastward.

Rogue river is noted for its steel-head and rainbow trout fishing. Many fly casting experts from New York and other eastern cities visit Medford for a week's fishing on the Rogue, yearly. A movement is under way to build a macadamized road from Medford to Crater Lake, a distance of 80 miles, at a cost of half a million dollars, work to begin the present summer. This will further enhance the value of Medford from an outing standpoint.

Before leaving Medford visit Jacksonville, one of the most interesting spots, historically, in Oregon. This is Jacksonville of the early mining days—

"When cards were religion
And pistols were priests"—
the little city today resting on streets of gold. Here you walk in the footsteps of men who made early Oregon, listen to tales of Indian life and legends, Indian peace and warfare, of gold discoveries, of quick justice and pioneer rule. Students of history and romance will find it well to seek out these recitals from lips yet able to frame weird tales from memory's notes.

Ashland's resorts are given as follows:

In the Foothills of the Siskiyou

Creeks and canyons have done their utmost for Ashland, which seems to have slipped into a niche in Oregon's coronet of cities, making the outing state complete. To people who want mountain air with all the comforts of civilization, Ashland is recommended.

Lying at an altitude of 1867 feet, in the foothills of the Siskiyou mountains, this city of 5000 offers a mountain resort to which man can suggest few improvements.

The Siskiyou mountains, to which Ashland introduces you, have no terrible crags or cliffs; they are deeply soil-covered, with heavy growths of timber and varied surface vegetation, contrasting with wide park-like areas. The slopes are steep, in series of exquisite glades, four and five thousand feet in depth, out of which bubble ice cold springs and swift streams. Fishing and hunting are excellent all through these mountains.

You can experience all the rugged delights of mountain climbing by going to the tops of Ashland Butte, Grizzly Butte, Mt. Wagner and Mt. Sterling—all reaching considerable

LOCAL ELKS GET A DISPENSATION

Can Now Go Ahead With Organization of Local Lodge—Elks Are Happy.

Word was received Monday afternoon by T. E. Daniels that the application for a dispensation for an Elks' lodge at Medford had met with success and that in the near future this city will boast of an organization of its own.

To the 80 or more resident Elks of Medford this means a great deal, to say nothing of the good it will do in a general way for Medford. Practically all the principal orders in the country are represented in this city with creditable organizations, but owing to the fact that 5000 population is necessary before an Elks' lodge may be organized, Medford has never been able to secure a charter.

Recently the local members of the order subscribed the necessary funds to pay for the taking of a municipal census, which was ordered by the city council, with the result that more than enough people were found to reside here to make up the desired number.

The securing of the dispensation for an Elks' lodge is no easy or simple matter, and while Medford is justly entitled to have a lodge, the people of the city may well be proud to know the organization is now assured.

This will mean in the near future the organization of a lodge and the probable erection of an Elks' temple in Medford. The charter member list has already been handed in and consists of old members of the order from other cities. No doubt this will be added to in goodly numbers in the future.

Cinderbar springs, Tolman springs, the Coletime Mineral Springs, in the very heart of the Siskiyou, Jackson springs, Murphy springs and Ashland Lithia springs are all strongly mineralized. Josephine Caves

Mammoth cave of Kentucky is duplicated many times over in Josephine caves of Southern Oregon. Situated in the southeastern part of Josephine county, at the headwaters of Williams and Althouse creeks, and penetrating a spur of the Siskiyou mountains, these caves present one of nature's most wonderful achievements. Each cave or series of caves maintains a peculiarly characteristic form and design. There is no end to the variety, beauty and grotesqueness of the many chambers, a very small number of which, proportionately, have been explored.

To reach Josephine caves, go to Grants Pass on the Southern Pacific and then there outfit for the trip, which is made to William's creek by wagon road and from there by pack trail, a total distance of thirty miles through the most beautiful mountain country imaginable.
