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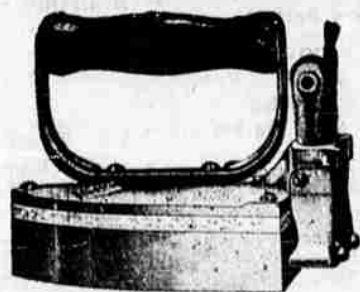

"Pinafore" Enjoyed By Many First
Nighters—Opera Scores a
Great Success.

"Pinafore," as presented by the Boston Ideal Opera company last night at the opera house, was remarkable for the opportunity given to members of the company outside of the stars to put on parts of some consequence. And to their everlasting credit let it be said that they arose splendidly to the occasion and handled their lines in a most acceptable manner. Louis Ballinger as Captain Cochrane and Miss Claremont as Hebe were both clever and entertaining.

Captain Cochrane is by far the best part Mr. Ballinger has presented. There was a vim to his work Tuesday evening which has hitherto been a stranger. His ballad to the moon as a curtain raiser in the second act was enjoyed as well as his dialogue.

Miss Claremont was as dainty and charming as a sweet girl graduate. At all times in her actions there is a spirit of sauciness upmost, and she appears at her best as Hebe.

Another minor member of the company was brought into the limelight, though not until the finale, and then only in a way to suggest the old phrase, "Some are born great, some achieve greatness, and some have greatness thrust upon them." Miss Maude Ragsdale, a charming member of the chorus, had greatness thrust upon her. That indefatigable fun-maker, W. E. Quisenberry, playing the part of Dick Deadeye, seized Miss Ragsdale from the chorus as the principals were pairing off and told the admiral to "make it four," when that worthy spoke of three weddings soon to be solemnized. Thereupon he carried Miss Ragsdale to the footlights and proceeded to keep her there much to her surprise and the delight of the audience. What Miss Ragsdale said to "Quis" back of the curtain is another story.

"Pinafore" is a delightful little opera in two acts, and is well worth the seeing. Special scenery has been provided and adds much to the performance. All of the old favorites—Mrs. Hazeltine, Miss Palmer, F. W. Walters and A. C. Burgess—are appearing and scoring their usual successes. It will be presented again on Thursday and Saturday evenings.
