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DEAD INDIAN COUNTRY IS DEPRIVED OF POSTAL SERVICE

Discontinuance of the mail service between Ashland and Odessa will deprive the Dead Indian country east of Ashland and a large number of people resident there of mail service entirely, except as served by the postoffice at Ashland, 25 miles distant.

It is probable that an effort will be made to establish a postoffice at Lilyglen or vicinity and secure a star route service to it from Ashland. At least there is talk of the procedure.

WASHINGTON, June 30.—It is announced that Secretary of the Navy George L. Von Meyer will visit California on a tour of inspection late this summer. The secretary will spend considerable time at the Mare Island navy yard, where he will watch the workings of the consolidation order that recently went into effect there.

WASHINGTON, June 29.—Seventy babies have died in Washington within the last six days as the result of heat, and poverty, according to an announcement today by the coroner. Charity is trying to alleviate the suffering. No relief from the heat is in sight.

GRATEFUL WOMAN GIVES LIFESAVER \$100 IN GOLD

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 30.—Because of his bravery in rescuing Mrs. Sadie Sunderland, aged 65, J. W. Lawrence is today richer by \$100 in gold presented to him this morning by the woman whose life he saved. Mrs. Sunderland while fishing Sunday at Sweetwater dam fell into 70 feet of water. Lawrence plunged in after her.

WILL TRY TO CROSS CHANNEL IN AEROPLANE

CALAIS, June 30.—Herbert Latham, Count de Lambert and Henri Farman are at present on the coast near here, awaiting favorable weather conditions to attempt an aeroplane flight across the British channel for a prize of \$5000 offered by a London paper. French torpedo-boats are being held in readiness to aid the aviators in their flight and rescue them in case of need.

NO MAN'S PHOTOGRAPH IS SAFE IN RHODE ISLAND

PROVIDENCE, June 30.—The publication of a person's photograph for advertising purposes without his permission cannot be made the basis of a lawsuit, according to a decision of the supreme court, handed down today by Chief Justice Dabois, in the case of James N. Henry vs. Cherry & Webb. The defendants published a photograph of Mr. Henry and a party of friends in an automobile as a means of advertising automobile coats. The case was certified from the superior court to the supreme, which decided in the negative these questions:

"Has a person at common law a right designated as a right of privacy for the invasion of which an action for damages lies?"

"Is the unwarranted publication of a person's photograph for advertising purposes actionable at common law where the only injury alleged is that of mental suffering?"

KAISER "WITH GOD'S HELP" WILL MAINTAIN PEACE

HAMBURG, June 30.—Emperor William, at a banquet today on the Hamburg - American steamship Deutschland, said of his meeting with the czar:

"I rejoice in being able to tell you, the representatives of trade and the business world, the meaning of that visit for the further preservation of peace. Emperor Nicholas and I agreed that our meeting must be regarded as an energetic proclamation of peace. We feel ourselves, as monarchs, responsible to God for the weal and woe of four peoples, which we want to lead forward as far as possible on their peaceful way to prosperity."

"All nations need peace in order, under its protection, to pursue their great mission of civilization and their economic and commercial development. Therefore we both will strive, with God's help and so far as lies within our power, to maintain peace."

ANNUAL SESSION OF THE SUMMER SCHOOL OPENS

The annual session of the summer normal of the S. O. State Normal school opened Monday morning, with a fair attendance, which it is expected will be augmented before the week is very old. The school is being conducted in the Normal buildings and Prof. W. T. Van Scoy is assisted by Prof. Cunningham in its work.
