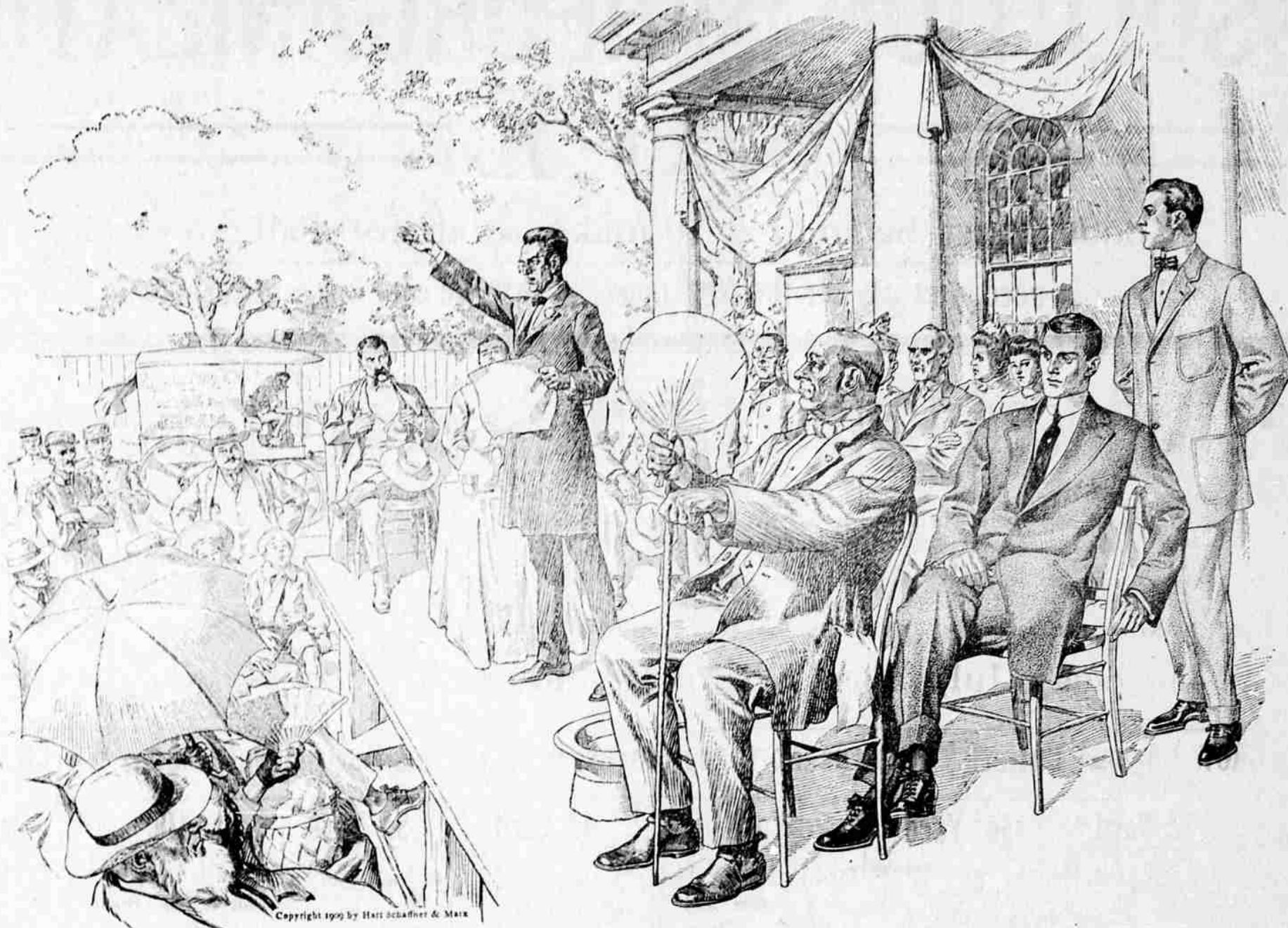

RAILROAD TRIES NOVEL STUNTS TO GAIN TRADE

SEATTLE, June 30.—In their bid for patronage, transcontinental railroads are inaugurating all sorts of improvements to induce travelers to come over their particular route. Among the many attractive innovations are those introduced by the Northern Pacific Railway company in connection with its dining car service. A 52-acre poultry farm is conducted at Kent, where 11,000 White Leghorn chickens furnish on an average of 150 dozen eggs a day. In Seattle the company operates three large bakery ovens, having a capacity of 2400 two-pound loaves a day. The butter used is from the North Yakima creamery, incased in four wrappers of oiled paper to protect it. Milk is served in individual bottles. These innovations are making travel to the northwest particularly attractive to easterners this year and are designed to leave a good aftertaste in all who come to the northwest.
