NOTICE TO PAVING AND CEMENT CONTRACTORS.

Notice is hereby given that the city council of the city of Medford, Oregon, will receive sealed proposals for the paving of West Seventh (or Main street) with bitulithic pavement and for the placing of concrete or cement curbing on both sides of said street from the east line of Laurel street west to the city limits.
