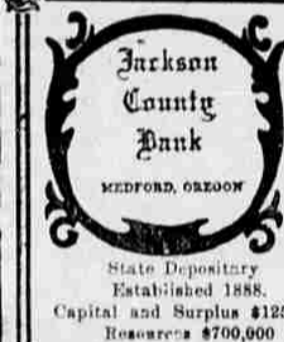

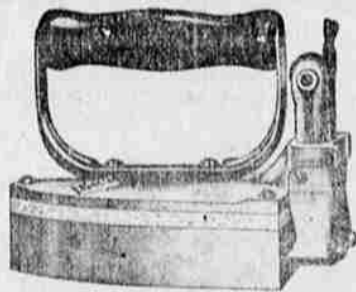

BURRO LINE TO THE "BUTTE" PROVIDED

Long Talked of Transportation Facilities to Scene of Perpetual Snow to be Reality.

The long talked of and hoped for scheme of transportation facilities to Mount Ashland has reached a satisfactory conclusion under the auspices of the Ashland Commercial club. A committee consisting of E. T. Staples, E. C. Gard and Louis Dodge, which was appointed to investigate with a view toward providing means of transportation for visitors through the canyon and to Mount Ashland, made reports and recommendations which were accepted by the club. The people of Ashland are unanimously enthusiastic about the matter and are assisting the enterprise by liberal aid in the way of subscriptions as fast as solicited, says the Tidings.

In looking backward, it is indeed surprising to know that this matter of popularizing Ashland canyon, Long's Lodge and Mount Ashland has been so long neglected by the city in general. Notwithstanding the fact that the people of Ashland generally favored an appropriation for the Crater Lake scenic wagon road, which would have cost this city alone in the neighborhood of \$10,000 or \$12,000 in taxes, yet no movement until the present time has been made toward opening up roads and trails up this magnificent canyon and to the summit of Mount Ashland, at our very doors, with provisions for transportation.

The arrangements which are being made provide for wheeled vehicles to carry passengers from Ashland to Long's Lodge, where, under the management of Mr. Long, sleeping and eating accommodations will be provided, and where he will maintain saddle animals for the trip up the bridle path to the summit of Mount Ashland, at which place there will also be provided shelter.

DRY LAW APPEARS TO AID BREWERIES

ST. LOUIS, July 2.—Although more than 80 Missouri counties are dry and the Sunday closing laws are enforced vigorously, the month of June, just closed, shows greater consumption of beer than any corresponding month since the creation of the office of beer inspector, eight years ago. The report of State Beer Inspector Ernest Marshall will be received by State Treasurer Cowgill today, with receipts of \$43,663. Only \$41,491 was taken in during June, 1904, the world's fair year. No June until now has equaled the receipts of that one. The wholesalers have done a big business in dry counties, many consumers buying beer by the barrel and whisky and wine by the case. No check is kept on the whisky and wine sold in Missouri.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—The treasury statement issued yesterday shows the government receipts for the fiscal year ended June 30 to have been \$604,432,846. The disbursements aggregated \$694,244,002, making a deficit for the year of \$89,811,856.

SHORT SIGHTED ONES BLOCK CRATER ROAD

Former County Judge John H. Scott of Marion Believes State at Large Sees Possibilities.

Salem Dispatch to Oregon Journal—Only shortsightedness on the part of some taxpayers in the state of Oregon has made them object to the construction of a wagon and automobile road to Crater lake, according to John H. Scott, formerly county judge of Marion county and president of the Good Roads association.

Judge Scott is emphatic in his statement that Oregon has been slow to show her unsurpassable wonders to clamoring tourists and that had California or Washington possessed a Crater lake millions of dollars would have been spent before this in the effort to make it accessible to tourists. He thinks also that another road from north to south should be added to the present plans.

"The construction of this road to Crater lake will be of inestimable value to the state at large," says Mr. Scott. "That improvement, with another thoroughfare from the north to the south, connected with similarly well constructed highways in Washington and California, would bring millions of dollars from automobile traffic alone."

"There would not be a great deal of money spent by tourists at hotels and summer resorts, but a great many of the tourists would become interested and would buy timber and farm lands and would assist in the great work of development, such as lies in the water power now dormant in this state."

Other State's Highways.

"If the state of California or Washington were to have a Crater lake, such as ours, they would without delay have spent millions of dollars in its development that would soon be returned to them manifold by tourists."

"The states of California and Washington are now constructing highways from the north to the south and it is incumbent on Oregon to construct a similar road if it is desired to reap the great harvest that would otherwise stop at the state line."

"Such a road would, furthermore, cause large hotels to be built at all the principal towns through which the road would pass and also would cause better accommodations to be made at or close to the sea coast and mountain resorts."

Great State Developer.

"Yes, it certainly would be a great state developer to construct a road running from east to west through the state of Oregon via Crater lake, and I consider it a mistake for any taxpayer in the state of Oregon to object to expending \$100 in the construction of a public thoroughfare to a point that has the possibilities that Crater lake has."

"Further, when the expenditure of the \$100,000 will cease to be expended another \$100,000, by the counties of Jackson and Klamath and several hundreds of thousands of dollars by the government."
