NOTICE TO PAVING AND CEMENT CONTRACTORS.

MURDERER GIVES UP HIS FREEDOM

Surrenders to Reporter of San Francisco Call in Order Another Man Might Go Free.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 2.—Learning that John Novak was accused of murdering Caroline Brash, aged 20, a bookkeeper for Gray Bros., James Edward Cunningham surrendered to a reporter of the Call last night. He confessed that he shot the girl on Wednesday and spent the rest of the night in the offices of the Call telling his story. He was turned over to the police this morning.

Cunningham was formerly employed by Gray Bros., and, according to his story, \$2.55 was deducted from the amount due. He said he had made repeated trips, but had failed to get it. Cunningham said in his confession:

"Before I went to the office I bought a revolver and cartridges. I am a crack shot, and knew one shot would do the work. Yes, the whole thing was premeditated, as they call it. The girl was given plenty of chance to pay the money. I am sure she was trying to hypnotize me, so I would not ask for the money."

He says he strolled about town, and when for the first time he saw in the paper that the police were accusing the wrong man, he decided to surrender.
