WORK BEGUN ON THE PANAMA CANAL LOCKS

WASHINGTON, July 6.—Preliminary work has already begun at Panama on the locks of the Isthmian canal. By the end of the summer construction in force will commence on these important adjuncts for the great waterway. Today the Isthmian canal commission opened proposals for furnishing a great quantity of castings and structural material for anchorage purposes, and for the mitering lock gates and for other requisites for use in the lock construction. Most of this material will be imbedded in the masonry work.
