

TWELVE MORE DAYS IN CONTEST

Visits will be made to some of the world's famous mining camps, whaling vessels will be seen, Alaska dog teams, and numerous other interesting sights too many to mention.

EMERICK PLACE IN ASHLAND SOLD

Property Purchased in 1907 for \$6500. Brings \$25,000—Improvements Worth \$3000 Put on Place.

George Morse, who recently sold his Phoenix orchard for \$80,000, has purchased the home place of J. C. Emerick, consisting of 20 acres in the city limits of Ashland, for \$25,000, and will hereafter make his home there. The sale was made by E. P. Hughes.

Mr. Emerick purchased the property for \$6500 in September, 1907, and has since spent \$3000 in improvements. He has more than doubled his investment in less than two years, which is only one instance of many that indicate the rapid advance in property values and the growth of Ashland.

Mr. Morse will cut the property into town lots and place them on the market, reserving 20 lots and the residence thereon for himself. The 70 other lots will be sold and it is probable that Mr. Morse will net as large a profit on the transaction as Mr. Emerick has.

TORPEDOBOAT FLEET ON THE SOUND

SEATTLE, July 6.—The United States torpedo boat destroyers Perry, Paul Jones, Truxton and Whipple are in Seattle harbor today, having arrived from the Mare Island navy yard last evening. They are moored at the city buoys, where they will remain at least until the beginning of next week. The destroyers Hull and Hopkins are expected from San Francisco in a few days.

It is not known at present what plans are in contemplation for the flotilla. It is expected that the destroyers will spend the summer on Puget Sound to engage in practice with the improved Whitehead torpedo.
