which includes intersections not covered by the proportion of intersection paving money allotted to this street.

Mayor Canon and members of the city council are receiving the congratulations today on having been able to successfully carry out both paving and water extension programs despite seemingly insurmountable objections, and at a reduced figure, thereby saving many thousands of dollars to the taxpayers. They found insufficient funds in the treasury for paving intersections, and none at all for water mains, but by hard work with the paving contractors and by securing a charter amendment permitting the application of the Bancroft act to the water mains, and stirring up a competitive bidder, have successfully carried out the work of municipal improvement at a saving to taxpayers.

Medford is to be congratulated on having such an efficient set of public officials.
