### BASEBALL PITCHER TURNS CHRISTIAN SCIENCE READER

BOSTON, July 8.—From a famous baseball pitcher to a humble and devout reader in the Christian Science reader is, in brief the life history of George S. Haddock of this city.

Haddock began his baseball career in 1888, before he was 20, with the Emporia team of the Kansas league. He was sought by the Washington Nationals and farmed out to Troy. That fall he went back to the Washingtons and pitched his first game against the Giants on the New York polo grounds.

The next year he joined the Brotherhood league and in 1891 pitched for the Boston Reds. During the two years following he played with the Brooklyn Nationals.

### AUTHORITIES WATCH HOTELS TO PREVENT OVERCHARGING

SEATTLE, Wash., July 7.—When anyone says that he has been overcharged in Seattle for rooms or meals, it is just as well to inquire for particulars. Where did he sleep and where did he eat? For months the chamber of commerce bureau has been listing rooms in various parts of the city and is prepared to give directions and to place visitors according to their tastes. Of course, one may go to the downtown hotels and pay downtown prices. These have not been increased since the opening of the exposition. But many visitors do not want to live in the business district, preferring to get up on the hills, where hotels are just as good and in every way more moderate in terms. There are ample accommodations, and anyone who has been a guest at one of these residence district hotels will confirm the assertion that the visitor will find modest prices with the best sort of surroundings and service.

### DIRIGIBLE BALLOON MAKES DAILY FLIGHTS AT FAIR

SEATTLE, Wash., July 7.—Daily flights of the Strobel airship at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition grounds have been attracting a great deal of attention. J. C. Mars is the operator, and he showed much skill in handling the flying machine. It mounts gracefully and soars majestically over the heads of the people, who crane their necks in wonderment at the flight. This is the first real dirigible balloon that has ever been seen in the northwest, and it demonstrates the possibilities of aerial navigation, which seems now to be realized on soon on in a commercial way. Aviator Mars won the airship race in St. Louis last year. As his wife is extremely anxious to accompany him on his flights, a larger balloon is being constructed which will carry more than one person. This is to arrive some time next month, so that persons anxious to cleave the air will have a chance to do so.

### NEW YORK-SEATTLE AUTO RACE ANNUAL EVENT

NEW YORK, July 7.—M. Robert Guggenheim has announced that hereafter the New York to Seattle automobile race will be an annual event. The start is to be made from the Atlantic coast on July 4, 1910, and every year thereafter on Independence day. The primary purpose of the race is to encourage the various states in good roads construction, so that a national highway will be built from coast to coast. This announcement was made by the millionaire automobilist at the banquet when the trophy was bestowed on the Ford car which won this year's race. Second honors went to the Shawmut automobile. The Acme car won third, the second Ford being disqualified for changing axles. The winning car crossed the continent in a little more than 20 days. Considering the obstacles and poor highways, this is remarkably good time. But before many years, Mr. Guggenheim says that he hopes to see the trip made in half the time or less. With a system of good roads from the Atlantic to the Pacific, he says, there is bound to be a great deal of transcontinental automobile travel.

### NO PRIZES WITH TOBACCO HEREAFTER

WASHINGTON, July 8.—The senate finance committee today reported its amendment to the internal revenue laws regarding the taxation of snuff, tobacco and cigars. The amendment provides that no coupons or prizes or any other inducements may be offered by manufacturers.

Snuff of all descriptions and chewing and smoking tobacco of all kinds will be taxed 8 cents a pound under the amendment as reported.

Cigars weighing over three pounds per thousand are kept at the rate of \$3 a thousand.

On cigars and cigarettes of a wholesale value of over \$110 a thousand the tax is \$9 a thousand. Cigars valued at between \$75 and \$110 a thousand are placed at \$6 a thousand.

Cigars weighing not more than three pounds per thousand are taxed at 75 cents.

On cigarettes weighing over three pounds per thousand the rate is increased to \$3.00 per thousand, and if they weigh not more than three pounds the tax is \$1.35.
