ATTEMPTED TO WRECK AN ELECTRIC CAR

COLFAX, Wash., July 8.—A bold attempt was made to wreck an electric train on the Spokane-Inland road from Colfax to Spokane at the Harpole tunnel yesterday morning. The would-be wreckers tied a heavy wrecking chain three times around a rail on the outside of a sharp curve near the entrance of the tunnel. Fortunately a freight train drawn by a heavy electric motor preceded the passenger. The wheels cut the chain in two, derailling the caboose and several cars without serious damage.

TIMBER NEAR CRATER LAKE IN DEMAND

Much Is Purchased on Stumpage Basis From the Government by Private Parties.

Officials of the forest service located in Portland report considerable activity in the vicinity of Crater Lake and Klamath Falls among private interests in the purchase of timber from the government on a stumpage basis. Under the direction of the forest service such timber is disposed of to private parties for from \$1.50 to \$3 a 1000 feet stumpage. With the exception of the locality referred to very little of the government holdings in this state is being disposed of.

This is due to two reasons. In the first place private interests very generally retain extensive holdings which will last them for years. Secondly, the reserves as a rule are not very accessible in this state owing to lack of transportation facilities.

In succeeding years, the government, through its established systematic method for managing its forests, expects to do an extensive business in this direction. As private holdings are depleted, the demand for the reserve forest lands will increase and the stumpage charge that will be asked by the government will advance accordingly.
