FORMER ICE KING WILL TRY TO REBUILD FORTUNE

NEW YORK, July 8.—Charles W. Morse, the financier who was recently released from custody on \$125,000 bail, pending his appeal for a new trial, has commenced the rebuilding of his fortune. He has rented offices in a Wall street building over the banking rooms formerly occupied by the National bank of North America, which was affected by the panic of 1907, and the troubles of which were blamed to Morse. In an interview the financier declared his confidence of re-establishing his credit, which before the crash amounted to more than \$30,000,000, although now he says he is starting in without a dollar of his own.

OREGON FUGITIVE CAPTURED AT BUTTE

SALEM, July 8.—Over ten years ago William A. King, while serving a term in the Oregon penitentiary, made his escape from that institution. He is now under arrest at Butte, Mont., and will be brought back to Oregon to complete his sentence of five years for a statutory offense in Baker county, July 24, 1897. King eloped while a trustee February 25, 1899. Nothing was heard of him until a few days ago, when he was recognized and arrested in Butte. Requisition papers were issued by Governor Benson and Superintendent Jones of the penitentiary departed today to bring the fugitive back.

TEXAS BREWERS STAND TO LOSE SUM OF \$100,000

GALVESTON, Tex., July 8.—At a meeting of the Texas Brewers' association, at which every brewer in the state was represented, a fund of \$100,000 was set aside to be given to public charity if they could not prove that more liquor is consumed in the prohibition or dry states than sections of the United States than in the free or wet sections. The decision is to be made by two commissions of six members, three to be elected by the breweries and three by the national or Texas prohibition party.

THREATEN TO DYNAMITE THE STOCK EXCHANGE

NEW YORK, July 8.—It was learned today that during Friday last a force of experienced detectives was on guard at the New York Stock Exchange due to the receipt by the police of a letter which threatened that between Friday and Tuesday the exchange would be blown up with dynamite. There was no untoward act during the time mentioned and today the force was withdrawn.
