GERVAIS, Or., July 8.- There is a noticeable improvement in the hop crop throughout this section, not that there will be more than was estimated, but the crop that was out is doing better than was anticipated. The increase in price has had the effect to spur the planters to better care of their yards, and where there was any apeparance of the vine it has been assisted, not for this year's results, but for the future. It is acknowledged that the missing hills are gone an ! that new plants must be set if the yards are to be continued. There are indications of lod age as well as pest, many holding that all this loss is attributable to cutworms. Others, however, hold the belief that it was the severe winter of last year. All these conditions no doubt contributed to the cause of the missing hop hills. There is no reason to count on more than two bales per acre as a state everage, or one-half a normal crop, say 45,000 to 50,000 bales.
