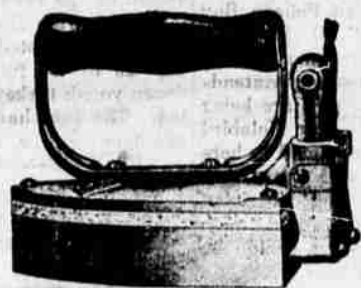

A KICK.

To the Editor: The condition of the lot on the northwest corner of Laurel and Main streets, fronting the West Side school grounds, is an eyesore to everyone who lives in the vicinity. For years it has been permitted to run wild, and grow up in weeds and brush. There is a cement walk on the Laurel street side, but ladies shun it on account of the dirty weeds that very nearly top over its entire surface. The owners of the property follow the custom of the early Indian inhabitants of the valley—they burn it over once a year. A man on horseback could get through the dog-fennel on the street side of the walk, if he had a good, tough horse. I have for some time been complaining about this nuisance, but our street commissioner has no time to attend to it. I hereby extend to the honorable city council an invitation to take a walk out Main and Laurel. By observing great care they can get down on the east side of Laurel, but until the dense underbrush is removed from front of the corner lot on Main and Laurel I would not advise them to attempt the west side.

CALIFORNIA COUNTY TO ISSUE BONDS FOR ROADS

ROSEVILLE, Cal., July 10.—The Committee on Ten Good Roads, recently appointed by Chairman Wilson, met at the Auburn Chamber of Commerce last night. Various means of improving roads were discussed. It was found there are about 252 miles to be improved. It was estimated that a large part of this mileage could be put in good shape for from \$150 to \$300 a mile, while the mountain roads would cost \$500 per mile and over. It was thought, however, that figuring \$500 per mile for the 252 miles of main roads would be a liberal margin, which would require a bond issue of about \$125,000.

To issue bonds for this amount, on a forty-year basis and the present assessed valuation of the county, would add about 8 cents to the yearly tax rate for the first year, which would be decreased yearly as the principal grew less and the assessed valuation of the county increased, as it is doing at a rapid rate.

CHOKING MAN COUGHS UP WHITE VEST BUTTON

SPOKANE, Wash., July 10.—Martin Smith, a Spokane householder, for two months had been losing flesh and sleep because he thought he had something like a lid on his windpipe. It would shut off his breath at intervals and threatened to kill him. Physicians treated him for throat trouble and tested him for heart trouble, but could not diagnose the ailment or give him relief.

Wednesday Smith had a paroxysm of coughing and after a violent heave cast forth a white vest button he had forgotten he swallowed. He is now recovering.

MESERVE ON APPLE BOX LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

SALEM, Or., July 10.—At the annual meeting of the State Horticultural society, held here, a committee was appointed to confer with the state board of horticulture for the purpose of choosing someone to represent Oregon and Washington next year, when apple box legislation comes up in congress.

The committee consists of L. T. Reynolds and H. B. Thielson of Salem; E. N. Shepherd of Hood River, Charles Meserve of Medford and Professor C. L. Lewis.

HARRIMAN IS EXAMINED: CONDITION SATISFACTORY

VIENNA, July 10. E. H. Harriman, accompanied by Professor Adolph Struempel, arrived here today to see Dr. G. A. Dickson, who examined Mr. Harriman, and also held a consultation with Professor Struempel. Both physicians agreed that the treatment Mr. Harriman was undergoing was effective, and that his condition was quite satisfactory. Mr. Harriman will remain in Vienna for two days, when he will go to Gastein, in Salzburg, to take the baths.

ORDINANCE NO. 20s.

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE USE OF THE STREETS OF THE CITY OF MEDFORD AND PASSAGE THEREOVER BY AUTOMOBILES AND OTHER MOTOR VEHICLES AND TO REGULATE THE SPEED THEREOF UPON SAID STREETS.

THE CITY OF MEDFORD DOETH ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. All that portion of the city of Medford lying between the west line of Holly street on the west, Bear creek on the east and the north line of Sixth street on the north, and the south line of Eighth street on the south is hereby declared to be and constitute the business portion of the city of Medford for the purpose of this ordinance.

Section 2. Every person is hereby forbidden to drive or cause to be driven any automobile or other motor vehicle within the business portion of the city of Medford at a greater rate of speed than eight (8) miles per hour, or to drive or cause to be driven any such automobiles or other vehicles over any other street of said city at a greater rate of speed than ten (10) miles per hour.

Section 3. No person shall drive or cause to be driven any automobile or other motor vehicle, within the business portion of said city, to be driven to and stop along the side or curb of any street within said business portion of said city, except the right side of said automobile or motor vehicle be next to said curb or side of said street.

Section 4. Every person who shall violate the terms of section 2 of this ordinance shall be guilty of misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof

shall be punished for the first offense by a fine of not less than \$10 or more than \$25 for the second offense by a fine of not less than \$25 or more than \$50; for the third offense by imprisonment at hard labor for a period of not less than ten or more than thirty days.

Section 5. Every person who shall violate provisions of section 3 of this ordinance shall be guilty of misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not more than ten dollars (\$10.00).

The foregoing ordinance was passed on July 6th, 1909, by the following vote: Merriek aye, Welch aye, Eifert no, Emerick aye, Wortman aye, Demmer no.

RESOLUTION.

Be it resolved by the city council of the city of Medford:

Whereas, J. E. Payette, James A. Storch, F. J. McAndrew and H. S. Roberts did heretofore duly petition the council that the north twenty-four feet of that portion of Sixth street, West, which lies within Bryant addition to the said city of Medford, and also for the vacation of the plat of said addition, now on record, in so far as the same is affected by the vacation of said portion of said street and the dedication of the land hereinafter described;

And, whereas, said petitioners as a condition and inducement to the granting of said petition for said vacation did offer to cause to be dedicated to the public use a corresponding amount of land as shown by an amended plat of said addition, which was attached to said petition; and

Whereas, due notice of the filing of said petition was given as required by law, and there was received by the council no objection of protest to the granting of said petition, said petition having been filed for more than thirty days and said notice having been given for a period of more than thirty days; and

Whereas, said persons have duly dedicated the land shown in said amended plat, in accordance with said petition;

Now, therefore, be it Resolved, That said North twenty-four feet of said portion of said street be and the same is hereby vacated.

The foregoing resolution was passed by the city council of the city of Medford on July 6th, 1909, by the following vote: Merriek aye, Welch aye, Eifert aye, Emerick aye, Wortman aye.
