

KLAMATH RESIDENTS DO NOT FAVOR CHANGE

But Little Support Is Given to Movement by Portland to Have Train Schedule Changed.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., July 12.—Residents of this section are not giving strong support to the movement on the part of the commercial bodies of Portland to have the time of the passenger train over the California Northern changed. Under the present schedule the train makes close connection with trains from the south and going out there is but a short wait going north.

Passengers coming from Portland to Klamath Falls are compelled to wait at Weed for almost twenty-four hours. This is objected to by the Portland organizations and requests have been received by local business men for assistance in securing a change which would be to the disadvantage of Sacramento and San Francisco, but would give Portland through connection.

The present train schedule was filed by the Southern Pacific at the request of this city and so far as Klamath Falls is concerned there is no desire to have it changed. It is a matter of statistics that the big bulk of the business transacted in this section is related to California. The established train schedule accommodates the majority of shippers.

Portland is rapidly awakening to the importance of the trade of this country and the movement to have the train schedule changed would be a material factor in getting a greater and firmer hold on the business of the rapidly growing country. It is not known here that there is anything being done by Sacramento to keep Portland from securing the desired change in the time of trains, but it does seem that it would be to the advantage of the wholesalers of the California city to use their influence with the Southern Pacific to have the present schedule continue.

NORTHERN KLAMATH A RESORT SECTION

KLAMATH FALLS, July 12.—Demand for summer homes in northern Klamath county is raising the price of lands in that section. Only a few years ago there was no demand for lands in that part of Klamath county except for stock ranches. Now every piece of land that has a stream of water flowing through it is considered a valuable property, and is commanding a high price.

Several small rivers formed by springs flow into the north end of the Upper Klamath lake. Most of these are deep enough for navigation by small boats. Senator Abner Weed of Siskiyou county, Cal., who has extensive holdings in that section, is now dredging a channel which will connect several of these streams and make it possible to run launches to many of the places that are being selected for summer homes.

Some of the owners of lands with streams flowing through them have been asked to sell small acreage tracts, and it is likely that the time is not far distant when all of the more desirable places will be subdivided. Every year sees an advance in the tourist travel coming to this county. Indications are that the number this year will be far in excess of any heretofore. Already a large number of people have visited the celebrated fishing resorts, and exceptionally good catches are being reported.

SAYS AMERICANS DO NOT KNOW JAP TASTES

WASHINGTON, July 12.—"America is losing an opportunity in Japan to establish trade because the manufacturers here do not know the Japanese taste," said Chubei Itoh, member of a large woolen and cotton exporting and importing firm of Osaka, now stopping in Washington. "It is because the manufacturers of woolen and cotton goods in America do not care to enter to the demands of the Japanese for color and texture that we buy most of our goods from England. For 30 years my house has been buying from woolen houses in Manchester, and not a cent's worth do we get from America. The manufacturers here could establish a market in Japan if they were to study conditions there, I believe, but so far as I can observe there has never been any effort made in this direction."

Mr. Itoh is on his way back to England. He spoke lightly of the possibility of conflict between Japan and America, saying that the Japanese are more interested in America than in any other country.

The board therefore, adjourned to the superior court room, but even this was not large enough to hold the interested people.

CITY NOTICES. RESOLUTION.

Be it resolved by the city council of the city of Medford, Oregon:

Whereas, there has been filed with the city council of the city of Medford a petition signed by more than one-fifth of the qualified electors of said city, as shown by the vote cast at the last municipal election held in said city, petitioning that the boundaries of said city of Medford be altered and new territory included therein as hereinafter set forth. It is therefore resolved: That the following question be submitted to the electors of said city, and also to the electors residing in the territory hereinafter set forth:

Shall the boundaries of the city of Medford be altered by including therein the following described territory, to-wit:

Commencing at a point on the present boundary line of the city of Medford, in section nineteen (19), township thirty-seven (37), range one (1) west of Willamette meridian, in Jackson county, Oregon, due west from the northwest corner of Sunrise Home Park addition, in said section, as laid in the plat thereof, on file in the office of the recorder of conveyances in said county; thence east one thousand four hundred and fifty (1450) feet, more or less, to said northwest corner of said Sunrise Home Park addition; thence east on the north line of said addition eight hundred and fifty-three (853) feet to the east line of donation claim No. forty-two (42); thence south on the east line of said donation claim No. 42 five hundred forty-seven and sixteen-hundredths (547.16) feet to the north line of Queen Anne addition to the city of Medford; the same being the section line between sections nineteen (19) thirty (30) of said township and range; thence east on said section line two thousand two hundred and fifty-three (2253) feet to the north-

east corner of said Queen Anne addition to the city of Medford thence south on the east line of said Queen Anne addition and said line extended ten hundred and forty feet to a point one hundred and thirty-two feet north of the northeast corner of donation claim No. 44 in section twenty-nine of said township and range; thence east 1544.4 feet, thence south 1609.8 feet; thence west 1544.4 feet; thence northerly ten feet more or less to a point on the east line of said donation land No. 44 1537.8 feet south of the northeast corner of said donation land claim No. 44; thence south seventy-two degrees and thirty minutes west five hundred fifty and eight-tenths (550.8) feet to the southeast corner of Imperial addition to the city of Medford; thence along the boundary line of said Imperial addition south seventy-two degrees sixteen minutes west thirteen hundred eighty-two and seven-tenths feet; thence north thirty-four degrees west one hundred thirty-eight and six-tenths feet; thence north thirty-nine degrees west one hundred seventy-five and five-tenths (175.5) feet; thence north forty-six degrees fifty-seven minutes west three hundred thirty-eight (338) feet; thence north nine degrees four minutes west eight hundred sixty-two and six-tenths (862.6) feet to the northwest corner of said Imperial addition and to the present boundary line of the city limits of said city; thence in a northeasterly direction following the present boundary line of the city of Medford to the southeast corner of Lindley addition; thence following said present boundary lines of said city in a general northerly and westerly direction to the place of commencement.

Resolved further, that said question be submitted to said electors of the city of Medford and to said electors of said above described territory at a special election to be called for that purpose, said election to be held on the 23d day of July, 1909.

Resolved further, that a special election in and for the city of Medford and in and for the territory hereinafter described, to be held on the 23d day of July, 1909, between the hours of 9 a. m. and 5 o'clock p. m., is hereby called for the purpose of submitting at said election said question above set forth.

The following are hereby designated as the places in said city at which the polls will be open within said city:

First ward—Commercial club rooms.

Second ward—Hotel Nash sample room.

Third ward—City hall.

The following is hereby designated as the place in the territory hereinafter described at which the polls will be open:

Residence of E. E. Kelley.

The following are hereby appointed and designated as judges and clerks of said election:

First ward in said city—A. C. Hubbard, judge; C. W. Davis, judge and clerk; J. E. Aston, judge and clerk.

Second ward in said city—J. H. Atwell, judge; Wm. Ulrich, judge and clerk; H. H. Harvey, judge and clerk.

Third ward in said city—M. F. McCown, judge; S. V. Davis, judge and clerk; H. A. Thierolf, judge and clerk.

In the territory hereinafter described—George Miller, judge; E. E. Kelley, judge and clerk; Clarence Pierce, judge and clerk.

The electors of said city of Medford and the electors of the territory hereinafter described are hereby invited to vote upon said proposition by placing upon their ballots "For Annexation," or "Against Annexation," or words equivalent thereto.

Resolved further, that notice of all matters herein set forth be given by publishing this resolution for four weeks prior to said election in The Medford Daily Tribune, a newspaper of general circulation in said city of Medford, and in the territory above described, and also by posting four copies of this resolution in four public places in said city and in four public places in the territory above described for four weeks prior to said election.
