



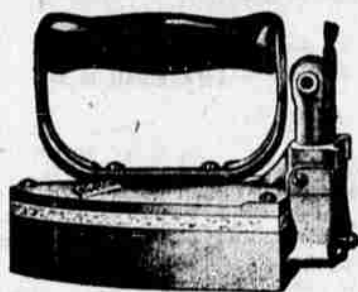

CITY NOTICES.

RESOLUTION.

Be it resolved by the city council of the city of Medford, Oregon:

Whereas, there has been filed with the city council of the city of Medford a petition signed by more than one-fifth of the qualified electors of said city, as shown by the vote cast at the last municipal election held in said city, petitioning that the boundaries of said city of Medford be altered and new territory included therein as hereinafter set forth, it is therefore resolved: That the following question be submitted to the electors of said city, and also to the electors residing in the territory hereinafter set forth:

Shall the boundaries of the city of Medford be altered by including therein the following described territory, to-wit:

Commencing at a point on the present boundary line of the city of Medford, in section nineteen (19), township thirty-seven (37), range one (1) west of Willamette meridian, in Jackson county, Oregon, due west from the northwest corner of Sunrise Home Park addition, in said section, as laid in the plat thereof, on file in the office of the recorder of conveyances in said county; thence east one thousand four hundred and fifty (1450) feet, more or less, to said northwest corner of said Sunrise Home Park addition; thence east on the north line of said addition eight hundred and fifty-three (853) feet to the east line of donation claim No. forty-two (42); thence south on the east line of said donation claim No. 42 five hundred forty-seven and six hundredths (547.16) feet to the north line of Queen Anne addition to the city of Medford; the same being the section line between sections nineteen (19) and thirty (30) of said township and range; thence east on said section line two thousand two hundred and fifty-three (2253) feet to the northeast corner of said Queen Anne addition to the city of Medford thence south on the east line of said Queen Anne addition and said line extended ten hundred and forty feet to a point one hundred and thirty-two feet north of the northeast corner of donation claim No. 44 in section twenty-nine of said township and range; thence east 1544.4 feet, thence south 1669.8 feet; thence west 1544.4 feet; thence northerly ten feet more or less to a point on the east line of said donation land No. 44 1537.8 feet south of the northeast corner of said donation land claim No. 44; thence south seventy-two degrees and thirty minutes west five hundred fifty and eight-tenths (550.8) feet to the southeast corner of Imperial addition to the city of Medford; thence along the boundary line of said Imperial addition south seventy-two degrees sixteen minutes west thirteen hundred eighty-two and seven-tenths feet; thence north thirty-four degrees west one hundred thirty-eight and six-tenths feet; thence north thirty-nine degrees west one hundred seventy-five and five-tenths (175.5) feet; thence north forty-six degrees fifty-seven minutes west three hundred thirty-eight (338) feet; thence north nine degrees four minutes west eight hundred sixty-two and six-tenths (862.6) feet to the northwest corner of said Imperial addition and to the present boundary line of the city limits of said city; thence in a northeasterly direction following the present boundary line of the city of Medford to the southeast corner of Lindley addition; thence following said present boundary lines of said city in a general northerly and westerly direction to the place of commencement.

Resolved further, that said question be submitted to said electors of the city of Medford and to said electors of said above described territory at a special election to be called for that purpose, said election to be held on the 23d day of July, 1909.

Resolved further, that a special election in and for the city of Medford and in and for the territory hereinbefore described, to be held on the 23d day of July, 1909, between the hours of 9 a. m. and 5 o'clock p. m., is hereby called for the purpose of submitting at said election said question above set forth.

The following are hereby designated as the places in said city at which the polls will be open within said city:

First ward—Commercial club rooms.

Second ward—Hotel Nash sample room.

OPERATIONS START IN BRADEN MINE

J. D. Dawson Plans to Work Mine on Large Scale and Will Increase Crew.

Operations have been resumed at the Braden mine, which has been closed down for some time past, by J. D. Dawson, formerly superintendent of the mine, and this well known producer may be expected to be turning out money for the lessees in a few weeks, says the Gold Hill News.

The mine is taken under lease by Mr. Dawson and his brother, and extensive development work will be done in the view of ultimate purchase of the property. The Braden has been a consistent producer for many years and is one of the best equipped mines in the district. Under Mr. Dawson's management several years ago it paid dividends to the stockholders, but later under a change of management lost money and was finally closed down.

The opening of the Braden may be, and doubtless will be, followed by the opening of others of the good properties in this district, which event will be hailed with delight by the people of this section who have faith in the mineral deposits tributary to Gold Hill and who believe that it only needs intelligent operation to demonstrate their value and permanency. There are plenty of partially developed mines and many likely looking prospects in this section, which only require capital, and not a great deal of that intelligently directed, to develop them into mines. The present owners are unable to handle them at present, but once let the stream of capital start to flow this way and Gold Hill will take its rightful place among the rich mining districts of the country.

Just a small force will be put on for a short time, but about the first of August Mr. Dawson expects to increase the crew materially.

BAILEY SAYS CONGRESS CAN TAX ALL RED HEADED MEN

WASHINGTON, July 17.—During the discussion in the senate of the power of congress to levy taxes, Senator Bailey, of Texas, made this contribution:

"I believe that congress can tax all red-headed men engaged in a given line of business, if it pleases. I think it would be a very foolish thing to do; but I have no doubt if the tax fell upon every red-headed man in Massachusetts the same as in Mississippi or Texas and all other states, the law imposing such a tax would be perfectly valid."

NEW RULING BY THE POSTOFFICE DEPARTMENT

Under the revised postal laws relating to the mailing of second class Publications, copies of a publication purchased by some individual or company cannot be mailed by the publisher at the second class rate of postage, but must be mailed at the transient rate, i. e., one cent for each four ounces, and by postage stamps affixed. The law reads as follows:

"Copies of a publication entered as second class matter when mailed by a publisher acting as an agent for an advertiser or PURCHASER shall not be accepted as sample copies. Copies sent on behalf of advertisers or PURCHASERS, shall be accepted for mailing when prepaid by stamps affixed at the transient second class class postage rate of one cent for each four ounces of fraction thereof, the same as if mailed by the advertiser or PURCHASER HIMSELF."
