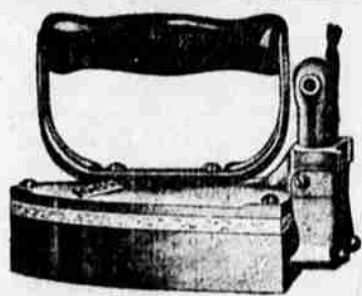

CITY NOTICES.

RESOLUTION

Be it resolved by the city council of the city of Medford, Oregon:

Whereas, there has been filed with the city council of the city of Medford a petition signed by more than one-fifth of the qualified electors of said city, as shown by the vote cast at the last municipal election held in said city, petitioning that the boundaries of said city of Medford be altered and new territory included therein as hereinafter set forth, it is therefore resolved: That the following question be submitted to the electors of said city, and also to the electors residing in the territory hereinafter set forth:

Shall the boundaries of the city of Medford be altered by including therein the following described territory, to-wit:

Commencing at a point on the present boundary line of the city of Medford, in section nineteen (19), township thirty-seven (37), range one (1) west of Willamette meridian, in Jackson county, Oregon, due west from the northwest corner of Sunrise Home Park addition, in said section, as laid in the plat thereof, on file in the office of the recorder of conveyances in said county; thence east one thousand four hundred and fifty (1450) feet, more or less, to said northwest corner of said Sunrise Home Park addition; thence east on the north line of said addition eight hundred and fifty-three (853) feet to the east line of donation claim No. forty-two (42); thence south on the east line of said donation claim No. 42 five hundred forty-seven and sixteen-hundredths (547.16) feet to the north line of Queen Anne addition to the city of Medford; the same being the section line between sections nineteen (19) and thirty (30) of said township and range; thence east on said section line two thousand two hundred and fifty-three (2253) feet to the northeast corner of said Queen Anne addition to the city of Medford thence south on the east line of said Queen Anne addition and said line extended ten hundred and forty feet to a point one hundred and thirty-two feet north of the northeast corner of donation claim No. 44 in section twenty-nine of said township and range; thence east 1544.4 feet, thence south 1669.8 feet; thence west 1544.4 feet; thence northerly ten feet more or less to a point on the east line of said donation land No. 44 1537.8 feet south of the northeast corner of said donation land claim No. 44; thence south seventy-two degrees and thirty minutes west five hundred fifty and eight-tenths (550.8) feet to the southeast corner of Imperial addition to the city of Medford; thence along the boundary line of said Imperial addition south seventy-two degrees sixteen minutes west thirteen hundred eighty-two and seven-tenths feet; thence north thirty-four degrees west one hundred thirty-eight and six-tenths feet; thence north thirty-nine degrees west one hundred seventy-five and five-tenths (175.5) feet; thence north forty-six degrees fifty-seven minutes west three hundred thirty-eight (338) feet; thence north nine degrees four minutes west eight hundred sixty-two and six-tenths (862.6) feet to the northwest corner of said Imperial addition and to the present boundary line of the city limits of said city; thence in a northeasterly direction following the present boundary line of the city of Medford to the southeast corner of Lindley addition; thence following said present boundary lines of said city in a general northerly and westerly direction to the place of commencement.

Resolved further, that said question be submitted to said electors of the city of Medford and to said electors of said above described territory at a special election to be called for that purpose, said election to be held on the 23d day of July, 1909.

Resolved further, that a special election in and for the city of Medford and in and for the territory hereinafter described, to be held on the 23d day of July, 1909, between the hours of 9 a. m. and 5 o'clock p. m., is hereby called for the purpose of submitting at said election said question above set forth.

The following are hereby designated as the places in said city at which the polls will be open within said city:

First ward—Commercial club rooms.

Second ward—Hotel Nash sample room.

Third ward—City hall.

Fourth ward—Hotel Nash sample room.

Fifth ward—Hotel Nash sample room.

MAN FROM MEDFORD BRUTALLY TREATED

Patrick Flynn Horribly Assaulted by Four Men in Portland—Wanders Hours in Greatest Agony.

Patrick Flynn, until recently employed as a farm hand near Medford, lies at the Good Samaritan hospital of Portland in a dangerous condition as the result of a dastardly assault, committed some time Friday night, says the Journal. Four men, of whom he gives a fairly good description, are wanted by the officers on a charge of assault, with a possibility that their crime may prove to be murder should Flynn die from his injuries.

Wounded in a most horrible manner and suffering most exquisite agony, Flynn, without funds and a stranger in the city, wandered from place to place seeking aid, before he was finally directed to the police station.

Flynn admits that he was very drunk Friday afternoon and night, and for this reason was unable to offer effective resistance to his torturers. He says that he wandered down the stairway leading from the Burnside bridge to the Couch street dock and walked across the planking down near two new planks and went to sleep. This was about 4 o'clock in the afternoon, and he did not wake until some time late at night, when four well dressed men awoke him and attacked him.

Most Brutal Assault.

His description of what followed is one of such brutality and wantonness that at first it seemed incredible, but when Flynn was placed on the operating table of Dr. Geary, the county physician, his story was confirmed. He was found to be injured internally, but Dr. Geary was unable to determine the extent of his injuries.

Last night on his bed of pain at the hospital Flynn told the revolting story to Deputy Sheriffs Bulger and Lillis and Detectives Reed and Hyde. The officers proceeded to the Burnside bridge and found on the upper deck of the dock the two planks described by Flynn.

Flynn says he never before saw the men who attacked him, but would be able to identify them. He says

he hit the hand of the ringleader until the blood came. This man wore a green checked suit and green hat. All the men were well dressed and wore collars and ties, he says, indicating that they were not of the hobo class.

Have Not Found Men.

If there are any hidden facts in the case that Flynn is concealing the officers have not succeeded in finding them. The possibility that the man had inflicted the injuries upon himself during his spree and afterward told the story of an attack by four men was rejected after examination as beyond the range of reason. Flynn at first said there were only two men, but his description last night, after his head had cleared, was circumstantial and bears the stamp of reliability.

It is hoped that Flynn may be able to add further particulars and furnish some clue to the men who assaulted him this morning. Last night he gave the name of one man whom he said lives at a north end lodging house, but investigation there failed to throw any light on the affair. Flynn came to Portland only three or four days ago from Medford, and knows few men in Portland. He says he expected to go to work on the new Madison bridge. He is probably 50 years of age.

Prepaid Railroad Orders.

"Something which is of considerable interest to the public generally and which is perhaps not generally known is the system of prepaid railroad orders now in effect between stations of the Southern Pacific company and all points in the United States.
