GRADE STAKES BEING SET TOWARD KLAMATH AGENCY

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., July 19.—
Indications are that no time is to
be lost by the Southern Pacific in
extending the California Northeast-
ern from this city. Right of ways
are being secured between this city
and the Klamath Indian reservation.
Engineers are in the field setting the
grade stakes. It has not been an-
nounced that Erickson & Peterson
have been awarded the contract for
25 miles from Klamath Falls, but the
numerous trips the contractors and
the construction engineers are mak-
ing would indicate that the contract
was awarded to them. Erickson &
Peterson have practically completed
all their work in this city, and it is
believed their entire force will soon
be transferred to the extension. At
present they are doing most of their
work on the spurs to the upper Klamath
lake.

FINE 37 YEARS OLD REMITTED

BLOOMSBURG, N. Y., July 19.—
After having been compelled to go
to Scranton and pay a fine of \$10
for failing to have a 50-cent revenue
stamp on a deed for a cemetery lot,
which was executed 37 years ago,
after writing the treasury depart-
ment at Washington as to whether
such a stamp was necessary, John
Farver of Bloomsburg has been made
happy by the return of the fine.
Judge Archbald of the United
States court, after the facts in the
case came to his knowledge, decided
that under the circumstances and the
deed being for a lot in a cemetery,
Mr. Farver was not liable to the fine,
and directed that the money be re-
turned to him.

HOBSON WITHDRAWS CRITICISM OF O'BRIEN

WASHINGTON, July 19.—In a
statement given out today Congress-
man Hobson withdrew the statement
he made recently criticizing Embas-
sador O'Brien, who had approved a
request of the Japanese of San Fran-
cisco for permission to sell liquor in
that city. He said that his criticism
was based upon the misinterpreta-
tion of a speech made by O'Brien.

FINCH'S ATTORNEY DECLARES CAN'T HANG IN OREGON

SALEM, Or., July 19.—Arguments
in the appeal of James Finch, who
killed Attorney Fisher of Portland
and was sentenced to hang, are be-
ing heard in the supreme court.
Finch's attorneys advanced the con-
tention that hanging is unconstitu-
tional in Oregon because the con-
stitution recites that all punishment
must be made with a view of reform-
ing the criminal.
