built. On the completion, land values went up from \$15 to \$23. In Bradley county, Tennessee, land values advanced from \$9 to \$15 and \$30.

Another curious but perfectly natural result of good roads is population. Buyers buy more readily when they can market easily. Take these figures:

In 25 counties, where there was only 1.5 per cent of improved roads, the population decreased in the ten years from 1890 to 1900 a total of 77,800.

In 25 counties, where 40 per cent of the roads were improved, the population increased in the same period 778,000.

The effect of good roads on school attendance needs no proof. In the five states having the best roads the average attendance is 77 per cent of enrollment. In the five states having the fewest good roads the attendance averages only 59 per cent.

With these figures on schools, it is not surprising to find that ignorance and bad roads go together. In the four bad roads states, with a total population of 7,000,000, are 375,000 men and women, white and native born, who can neither read nor write. In four good roads states, with a population of 6,000,000, are only 20,000 illiterates.

KILLS THE GIRL WHO WENT BACK ON HIM

FORT LEAVENWORTH, Kan., July 21.—Because she had pilted him, Private Charles O'Neal of the Thirtieth infantry, stationed here, today shot and killed Minnie Scharbora, aged 23 years, a French maid employed in the home of Captain Charles N. Murphy. O'Neal called at the front door of the Murphy residence in the aristocratic thoroughfare of the town, and without a word shot the girl.

Several officers and their wives, sitting on their porches nearby witnessed the tragedy. O'Neal was captured quickly and placed in the guardhouse.

Later, through an error, he was placed with other prisoners to work on a roadway and escaped.

CLERK MISSING; S. P. BOOKS SHORT

SAN FRANCISCO, July 21.—Melville C. Cleaves assistant local freight agent of the Southern Pacific Railroad company, in whose offices thefts of more than \$6000, charged to the three clerks, were discovered two weeks ago, could not be found yesterday by his superiors, and a clerk sent to the railroad official's residence, 1442 East Seventeenth street, Fruitvale, found the house closed and dark. Neither Cleaves nor his wife could be found.

GOOD ROADS SHOW AT SEATTLE FAIR

Splendid Lessons Taught by Exhibit of Methods of Good Roads Building.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 21.—For the first time at any world's fair a separate building has been devoted to the good roads exhibit at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition.

This building is permanent and was erected at a cost of \$10,000. It will be used by the University of Washington as a school of good roads after the exposition.

The exhibits are arranged to work out for the benefit of the people of the northwest, the economy of all of the important pavements and roads.

In the large room to the left of the main entrance has been placed a model of the Deception Pass quarry, which will soon be put in operation by the state of Washington. All of the equipment of this quarry is reproduced in miniature to represent the state plant, which is probably the best quarry in the United States for producing road building material.

Models of different sections of road, together with miniature road building machinery, are placed in the exhibit room. In the south front room is the laboratory testing equipment, which will be used to carry out a series of practical tests during the summer.

Near the Good Roads building have been laid three short sections of pavement, one asphalt, the other brick, and the other wood block. The relative force required to draw a given load over all three of these roads will be determined by a series of experiments.
