MARSHFIELD, Or., July 21.—The lifesaving crew and fishermen are today searching for an overturned boat which has been reported four miles off the mouth of the Coquille river by the captain of the Nan Smith. The captain sent a wireless message here telling of the wreck, but said he could not make out the name. It appeared to be the hull of a barge or gasoline boat. No boat has been reported missing at this port. There is little doubt among old "salts" here that some lives have been lost.

COST UNCLE SAM MUCH TO PROTECT HIS FORESTS

For the administration and protection of the 148 national forests in 19 states and territories and Alaska, the government spent \$2,526,098.02, or about one and one-half cents an acre for the calendar year 1908. Of this amount \$592,169.18 was spent for permanent improvements, including the construction of 3400 miles of trails, 100 miles of wagon roads, 3200 miles of telephone lines and 40 miles of fire lines.
