BUILDING FISH WAY ANENT DAM

Large Force of Men Putting in New Fishway, Which Will Be the Best in the State.

Work on the new fishway at the Anent dam started in last Saturday and now there is a good force of men on the job and the force will be enlarged as soon as the men can be secured. The difference between the state and the Anents and the irrigation company have been agreeably settled and Deputy Fish Warden Clanton is giving the work his undivided attention. The plans of the fishway have been changed somewhat from the original plans, but the fishway will be a channel cut about 50 feet back and around the dam on the south side and this channel will be cemented on the sides and bottom and the channel covered. When completed it will be one of the best fishways in the state and it will take about two months to complete the work.

It has been rumored for the past week that the government was going to put in the fishracks down the river again this season and that some of the men to operate the same had already been engaged. However, when Fish Culturist Kelley says that so far he had received no instructions in regard to the matter and if they were to be put in he knew nothing about it. Last year the government put in the racks right after the commercial fishing closed and as the season for commercial fishing closes on the first of August it seems that if they intended to do anything this year the order would have been issued before this. Those who fish with hook and line are in hopes that they will not be put in, as it stops the fish from coming up. Last year when the racks were put in there was poor fishing up this way, but below the racks the fishing was good.

BOY OF SIXTEEN HAS HIS HAIR CUT FOR FIRST TIME

FRANKLIN, Pa., July 22.—Harry Sanford, 156 years old, residing near Franklin, had his hair cut today for the first time in his life. He has wanted it cut for several years, but his parents, proud of his hair, refused to allow it. But the boy is going to college next fall, and he told his parents today that he was going to have his hair cut whether they gave him permission or not. His locks when shorn weighed more than a pound.

Up to the time he was 8 years old Harry wore his hair loose about his shoulders, but of late years he has braided it and let it hang down his back under his coat. Even this was very conspicuous, and the boy never liked to come to town because he attracted so much attention.

Because of his sensitiveness the lad never associated much with other boys, devoting most of his time to school studies and his violin. As a result he enters college at 16 and is a proficient violin player. Like Samson of old, Harry possesses unusual strength, and "Samson" is his nickname.

PROSPECTING WITH DIAMOND DRILLS

Mines Near Grants Pass Will Be Thoroughly Tested as to Extent of Ore Bodies.

Mining operations in southern Oregon are looking very prosperous at the present time and especially in Josephine county. The latest addition to mining activity is to be done by the National Copper Mining company, whose property is located adjoining the old Buckeye property west of Grants Pass. This week a large batch of machinery was received by this company including gasoline engine, etc., together with a diamond drill. This is the first diamond drill brought into that section and it is said to be of the latest design. It is capable of going down 400 feet and after the work is done with this drill the company will know exactly what they have on their property.

A man who has been in Grants Pass for the past month going over the mining fields of the county, made the statement that in his opinion inside of 18 months that section would be one of the largest mining camps on the Pacific coast. He left the latter part of the week for the east, but said he would return in a couple of months. It is an old saying that heretofore what development work that has been done has not gone much below the grass roots, but this year the development work has been of a more systematic nature and the ore bodies have been blocked out so that the owners could determine what they had.
