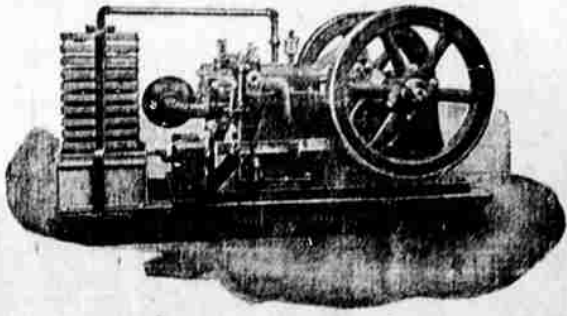

COAL LANDS ARE WORTH MILLIONS

Lands Withdrawn From Entry Now Offered at Higher Price.

Announcement has been made today that the Department of the Interior has just classed as coal land and restored to the public domain certain unappropriated lands in the Evanston land district, Wyoming, fixing the price for disposal of the tracts there in some cases as high as \$500 per acre. This land contains one of the finest coal veins in the west.

The tract was included in the lands involved in what was known as the Horse Thief canyon cases. Investigation some months ago by special agents of the department disclosed that the title to much of the government valuable coal lands in that part of Wyoming had been secured through a system of alleged fraudulent operations, and suit was instituted against the patentees to recover the lands. Finally the defend-

ants reconveyed the lands to the government, paying about \$40,000 for coal extracted.

Worth More Money.

"This is a striking instance of results obtained through investigations made by the special service force of the general land office," it is declared in the state regarding the policy of disposing of public lands containing coal at prices based upon their intrinsic value for coal.

"Under the former method of disposing of coal lands there lands were subjected to sale at \$10 and \$20 per acre or total price for the township about \$450,000 if sold at a maximum price. At the prices now fixed the lands in this township are worth \$8,134,000 or an increase of more than \$7,500,000 above the former price."

During June last coal lands which had been withdrawn were classified and restored to entry, the total valuation of which amounted to \$18,543,232. At the old prices these lands were worth \$7,650,000, an increase of approximately \$11,000,000 over the old price. Since about 30 per cent of these lands were subject to disposal by the government at the prices fixed, the revenue derived therefrom will be about \$6,000,000 in excess of what it would have been under the former policy.

The Characteristic National Meal.

It is not only in Scotland that breakfast is the characteristic national meal. Travel where you may, the first meal of the day is the one that strikes the foreign note, luncheon and dinner having gradually absorbed cosmopolitan qualities that are not even confined to hotels. But you never feel so much of an Englishman as when Switzerland gives you rolls and butter and honey and nothing more with your coffee or when France makes this into one exquisite crumbling "croissant," with an inch or two from a yard long loaf, or when Denmark adds cream instead of milk to the coffee and a dangerous piece of pastry to the black bread and round white roll. Yet our English breakfast became an institution only in the eighteenth century. Before that only royalty breakfasted off meat, bread and cheese and ale. The commoner, such as Pepys, took merely a morning draft of buttered ale.—London Chronicle.

Dresden a City of Pleasure.

Dresden is essentially a city of pleasure—of fair, wide prospects, of hearty river life, of zest in nature and art. Even the public buildings cluster about the Elbe just as the huts of the first settlers clustered. A circle of Wendish herdsman's huts on the right bank, a line of flasher shanties on the left—these were the unlikely beginnings of Dresden in the sixteenth century. But the settlement lay at the only point in the river valley where a ford was practicable, tempting the Germans to settle on the left bank between the Wends and the swamps, or Seen, unlovely places that have long since disappeared, leaving behind only the names Seestrasse, Am See and Seevorstadt. Indeed, the very name of Dresden is derived from the Slavic dresjan, which means "dwellers in the swamp forest."—Robert Haven Schuchler in Century.
