TAFT PROMINENT SUMMER BATCHELOR

Having Splendid Time at White House While Mrs. Taft Is Absent at Summer Residence.

President Taft is enjoying another distinction. He is the most prominent "summer bachelor" in the country. Ever since the 5th of the month when he took his family down to Beverly and left them there to enjoy the cool breezes of Salem Bay, he has been leading a single life, and since returning to Washington on the 9th, he has "bachelored" at the White House. Colored Mary—her other name being unknown at the White House—is the president's cook and as she is an expert at preparing hoe cakes and fried chicken, as well as many other toothsome southern dishes, the president is not suffering from the pangs of hunger during Mrs. Taft's absence. When Mrs. Taft went to Beverly, she took with her Miss Jefferson, the housekeeper, and the chief cook. Mary seems to be running the culinary end of the White House just at present very well—so well, in fact, that the President generally has two or three guests at luncheon or dinner.

Most of the afternoons are devoted to golf by the President, and since the extreme hot weather began he has taken to automobile riding of evenings. As soon as dinner is over, the big touring car rolls up to the White House porte cochere and the President climbs in. Usually he is accompanied by Captain Archibald Butt, his chief military aid, or some member of the Cabinet. The evening rides are taken in the neighborhood of Rock Creek Park or around the Potomac Drive below the Washington Monument. The President arises at 7:30 in the morning, exercises with dumbbells for fifteen or twenty minutes, and breakfasts shortly after 8. He is at his office by 9:30 a. m.

Of late he has broken away from time honored convention, and has taken an informal dinner at one of the embassies or legations. The first embassy thus to be honored by having the presidential feet beneath its table was that of France. Ambassador Jusserand is quite as popular with the present administration as he was with the preceding one. This despite the fact that he plays tennis, but knows nothing of golf.

ASHLAND PAVING IS RAPIDLY PROGRESSING

Warren Construction Company Rushing Work in Neighboring City.

ASHLAND, Or., July 24.—The Warren Construction company, who have the contract for the paving of the principal business sections of Ashland, from Helman street through town to the depot at A street with bitulithic pavement, are pushing the work rapidly under the superintendence of Mr. Copeland.

The curbing work was let to a separate firm, who are rapidly bringing the work to completion, and the street excavation is being carried on energetically by the Warren Construction company. It is a large job, as much dirt must be removed.

The work of getting out the crushed rock is being made ready by the establishment of a rock crushing plant on the county road between the Eagle mills and the Wyant place on a large ledge of fine rock located on E. K. Anderson's land. It was located there on account of the quality of the rock being more suitable for paving. Electric power will be used if available. It is planned to haul the crushed material to town with a 35 horse power traction engine, in solid trains of from six to ten wagons each, the number depending upon experimentations to be made. Each wagon will hold about 2½ cubic yards of crushed rock, and it is expected that a service of four trains per day will be established over this line, based on a working day of 14 hours.

At the rapid rate things are moving it will be only a short time before the bitulithic hot stuff will be laid down on our streets.

This is the best time in the year to pave a street, and will allow for the most substantial kind of work, as far as weather is concerned.

U. S. ASKS MEXICO TO BLOCK RACE TRACK SCHEME

WASHINGTON, July 24. — The concession recently granted by the Mexican government to a company of horse race promoters in California for a race course at Tia Juana, a village in Lower California, near the boundary of California and within a short distance of San Diego, probably will be rescinded.

The people of San Diego protested in strong terms to the state department and requested this government to secure its revocation. The state department sent these protests to President Diaz through the American ambassador. Attention was called to the fact that the encouragement of horse racing at Tia Juana, which had become outlawed in California, would be an offense in the eyes of the people of that state, and that the races would be patronized only by Americans.

The United States did not question the right of Mexico to grant the concession, but while no response has yet been received, the state department has strong hopes that its request will be willingly complied with.
