POOR QUALITY IS CAUSE OF DROP

Bartletts Drop in New York Market
Owing to Offerings of Poor Quality of Fruit.

The New York market on Bartlett pears today dropped to \$2.25, for which the condition of the fruit was mainly responsible. Two cars sold for \$2.70, but low quality caused one car to drop to \$1.60. There is a steady demand for high-grade fruit. Prices today averaged as follows:

PEACH PLUM MAKES THEIR APPEARANCE

Local Tomatoes Are Beginning to Come In as Well as Cantaloupes and Watermelons.

Peach plums have made their appearance in the local markets and are offered at 6 cents. They are an exceptionally fine table fruit. The offering is light. Early summer apples are finding a steady demand at 2 cents, while early pears are selling freely at 3 cents.

Local cantaloupes are beginning to drift in, but have as yet hardly affected the arrival of Californians. They are selling at reasonable prices. Local watermelons will be on the market during the week. Among other fruit offered is a shipment of fresh Hawaiian pineapples, which are meeting with favor. Bananas are offered freely at a shade lower price.

The vegetable market is well supplied. Local tomatoes are coming in and within a few days the supplies will be equal to the demand. California tomatoes are offered at slightly reduced prices today. There is an abundance of onions, beets, carrots, cabbages, squash, string beans and the like. Potatoes are showing an inclination to decline. New potatoes are offered freely. Berries are offered freely and at lower prices. The offering of green corn is very light. The Medford markets are especially well stocked today with fresh vegetables and fruit.
