TELEPHONE LINE UP MT. ASHLAND IS COMPLETED

Telephone communication between Ashland and the summit of Mt. Ashland, in the Siskiyou, altitude 8000 feet, was successfully established Thursday, and members of the Ashland Siskiyou Club, a local organization of mountain climbers, sent the first message of greeting over the line, which is an extension of the forest service telephone line, built through the Ashland forest reserve and connecting with the Sunset telephone exchange in Ashland. The distance from Ashland to the summit of Mt. Ashland is approximately 12 miles, and the trip is being featured as one of special attractiveness, on account of the splendid scenic points covered by it through Ashland Canyon and the Siskiyou. A good trail has been constructed and the summit is easily reached on horseback when desired. Mt. Ashland is perpetually covered by snow. Hundreds of people have made the ascent to the snow since the Fourth of July.

Music lovers will be offered a rare treat at Ashland Tuesday evening, Aug. 3d, when Mrs. Carrie Roper Von Benson will be heard in concert. Mrs. Von Benson needs no introduction to any but newcomers in the valley, as her fame as a vocalist has been long established. In addition to the vocal numbers, there will be a series of stereopticon views of more than ordinary local interest, among which will be a number that will occasion much surprise.

The entertainment will be given in Chautauqua Tabernacle and the admission has been put at 25c in order that all may enjoy the treat.

MRS. ISAACS NOW CHAMPION ANGLER

Snatches Laurels From Toggery Bill by Landing a Steelhead that Weighs 8 Pounds Dressed.

Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Isaacs have returned from a week's fishing trip on the Upper Rogue River, during which Mrs. Isaacs snatched the laurels from Toggery Bill's brow as champion of local anglers, landing, after three quarters of an hour's battle, a steelhead that weighed, dressed, over 8 pounds, caught with a No. 6 Royal Coachman fly, upon a six-ounce rod. But few steelheads were caught during the trip, though a large number of cut-throats fell victims to the two champions. Toggery Bill states that there are but few steelheads in the river and that angling is poorer than known for years. The slaughter by seiners at Grants Pass and at the mouth of the river has told on the supply. Mrs. Isaacs brought back an affidavit signed by Trail witnesses as to her feat in landing the big steelhead, which is of unusual size for this season of the year. As the fly was a Rogue River Special from the Medford Hardware Co., Mrs. Isaacs leads in the contest among anglers for the \$80 outfit offered for the largest trout caught during the season on one of their flies.

MEDFORD SPIRIT IS PRAISED BY VISITORS

Judge Coke, of Marshfield, and J. W. Perkins Both Speak Highly of City's Progress.
