BIG DEMAND FOR AMERICAN APPLES

Writing from Hamburg, the U. S. consul general, Robert P. Skinner, says that there is a large demand in Germany for American apples, and one that can be increased by intelligent effort on the part of American packers and shippers, to which may be added a very considerable demand in Denmark, Norway and Sweden now satisfied by the whalesale importers at Hamburg. Mr. Skinner's details of the trade follow

Practically the whole of the business is centered in Hamburg, two to cal firms receiving about two-thirds of the total importation houses send their own representatives to America, who visit the interfor apple packers, inspect the new crops in the storage warehouses at the ports of shipment, and then give their orders. Apples from the East ern and Middle Western states only are sold on firm orders. Nearly all the fruit received from the Westers ment. The local importers keep their American correspondents regularly informed as to the German market and as to the quantities to be shipped.

Sold at Auction. Upon arrival at Hamburg a shipnent is immediately offered for sale at auction, all sales taking place in the same warehouse. Before the sale begins an impartial sampler selects a certain number of unopened barrels and opens one-half or this number at the top and the other half at the bottom. The possible buyer must bibd upon the lot, accepting quality of the cutire shipment, and he cannot demand that other barrels be mened. The sampler is chosen by he fruit dealers and is a dealer himeff, and at regular intervals he give: way to another appointee. Differ-

In general American apples arrive n good condition, although shipment have been sold of which a quarter of the contents of the barrels was spoild. One obstacle to the development of the business is the San Jose scale m-pection requirement of Germany. Apples containing the scale are reused entry and are thereupon directed to other markets where they command lower prices. Some im-
