FRUIT SALES IN MARKETS EAST

Heaviest Offering of Pears Was in New York Market—Fruit Ripe to Over-Ripe.

Advice received by the Tribune today show that 21 cars of Bartlett pears were sold in the east on Monday. The heaviest offering was in the New York market. The fruit was ripe to over-ripe.

Under date of August 3 Rae & Hatfield have issued the following New York deciduous market letter: Forty-three cars of California deciduous fruit sold here today.

Weather fine and cool. Good attendance at sale. Pear market irregular here today—open weak, then gradually strengthening towards the center of the sale.

Peaches were mostly ripe to over-ripe. Crawfords averaged 82c, Foster's, 88c, crates \$1-12, Tuscan Clings \$1.10.

Plums in moderate receipt, but prices were a little lower. Diamonds averaged \$1.75, Imperials \$1.25, Bradshaws \$1. Sugars mostly \$1.25 to \$1.62.

A car of Malagas from Imperial Valley sold most \$1.80. About 40 cars expected to be sold tomorrow.
