GOOD OFFERING LOCAL MARKETS

Blackberries Down to Bottom Prices
—Ranch Butter Makes Advance.

The week has opened with a good offering of all reasonable vegetables and fruits in local markets. Potatoes have made a slight fall since last week and tomatoes are offered at lower prices. Otherwise prices remain the same on vegetables.

Now is the time for the housewife to get up her blackberries for winter. They have been offered freely and consequently are much cheaper. They have perhaps touched bottom at present.

Merchants are paying 27½ cents for ranch butter this week as against 25¢ last week. Creamery butter remains at 32½¢.

PROSPECT BRIGHT FOR \$3 MARKET

Local Fruit Growers Will Receive Ton Price for Bartletts This Season.

The market for Bartlett pears in New York is constantly improving. Brokers in New York expect a \$3 market for Rogue River valley fruit. Nearly all of the California crop is off and the local fruit will arrive at the best possible moment.

Under date of August 9 Sgobel & Day have the following to say of the Bartlett pear outlook:
Bartletts—39 cars sold. They sold from \$2.50 to \$1.50, but the great if good and greenishmellowpippin bulk of them brought \$2.25 to 2 if good and greenish, and \$1.87 to \$1.62 if yellow and ripe. 18,500 boxes on top of 68,000 boxes last week shows a wonderful situation, however there is no such desirable fruit for New York as the Bartlett pear, if not too ripe on arrival here, and our friends in the northwest who have them are fortunate this year. This is the last heavy week, as the shipments from California are dwindling rapidly. Strong market ahead on good Bartletts.
Regard the other markets Sgobel & Day say:
Prunes—Small shipments arriving and smaller daily leaving California. Today Gross Hungarian \$2.10 to \$1.75, Fellenberg (Italians) \$1.15, \$1.20, German \$1.20 to 90¢, Silvers \$1.37 to 90¢, Egg \$1.35 to 95¢. Everybody is asking us when the Italian prunes are going to start and the dealers are all ready for them, as they know of the fruit crops being short almost everywhere, in Oregon, Washington, and especially in southern Idaho, where the production this season is very small indeed compared with the past. High prices will rule on Italian prunes if they are good.
Peaches—Bulk of arrivals came from the Fresno section, but generally the peaches did not look well, and there was quite some decay, so the market sold off.
Grapes—Most of these also came from southern California and were soft, so they sold low. The weather yesterday and today has been extremely hot.
The market Saturday for Bartletts was firm, owing to a light offering. The general range of prices:
