Not much change in market condition today. Green pears continuing to do well, but many ripe and over-ripe, bringing our general average down to \$1.76.

Peach market in the dumps. Many ripe and wasty and bringing the price on good peaches down. Crawfords averaged 51c, Elbertas 62c, Susquehannas 53c.

Car of Malagas in wrecked condition average 86c. Thompson Seedless sold from 60c to \$1.25, mostly 70c to 85c. Tokays \$2.29.

Fancy plums sold well, but ordinary were lower. Hungarians averaged \$1.34, Gros \$1.60, Giants \$1.20, Kelseys \$1.60, Eggs, 95c, Imperials 77c.

ROGUE FRUIT IN PORTLAND MARKET

Ashland Peaches Bring Fancy Prices
in the Metropolis of
Oregon.

Journal: The first full car of Rogue River fruit was reported this morning from Grants Pass by Dav- enport-Thompson company. The car was half peaches and half pears and was in excellent condition, as has been all the express shipments from that direction the present season.

There continues an acute scarcity of pears in the local market and the half car which was reported in today will be quickly picked up from present indications. California pear season is about closed and the local output has just about started toward market.

Pear shipments from Medford are expected to be made daily to eastern points from this time forth. The crop there has turned out better than expected both as regards quality and quantity.

Peach Supplies More Liberal.

Supplies of peaches are somewhat more liberal in the Front street market at this time. Local shipments are coming in better, although complaint is made of some very small sizes from the valley. Eastern Oregon seems to be out of the fruit business so far as Portland shipments are concerned at this time.

Some extra select Ashland peaches sold as high as \$1.15 a box in the Front street market during the day, but because of the more liberal offerings the general run did not range above 90c, although once in a while a single box was sold at \$1. Some sales of good stock were made in lots around 80c a box and some very small fruit went down to 50c. Good quality, however, sells well.
