## MERLIN SHIPPING CARLOAD A DAY

Each Shipments in Full Blast—Seattle Takes Almost the Entire Crop.

MERLIN, Or., Aug. 18.—The shipment of peaches is now on its full blast, and they are now going forward at the rate of a carload a day. They are all going to Seattle, as almost the entire crop was sold to a firm in that city over a month ago. This is the first year that carload shipments have been made, but with the large number of trees that will come into bearing next year it is likely to be the regular mode hereafter. The quality this year is very fine and the yield far above the average. The shipping of Bartlett pears is now under full way from Rogue River valley. The fruit is of perfect quality, the size being large and the fruit very uniform and symmetrical in shape. Every pear tree in the valley is heavily loaded and trees that were not properly thinned are to be seen with broken limbs, caused by the excessive weight of fruit. The crop for this season of all varieties of pears is estimated at about 300 cars of 500 boxes each.

The bulk of the pears from Rogue River valley are shipped to New York and from there sent to the other eastern markets and to London and other European markets. The pears are shipped in refrigerator cars and are from 15 to 17 days on the way, but so well do the Rogue River varieties stand shipment that they arrive in as good condition as do those sent to local markets. The leading varieties grown in this valley are the Comice, Bartlett, Anjou and Winter Nellis. Some Bose and Howells are grown, but these varieties have been found to be less profitable than the others, and now but few trees are being planted. Nurserymen and well posted orchardists say there will be fully 5000 acres set to pears in Rogue River valley this winter.

Rogue River valley holds the banner in the fruit pest warfare over all the other fruit districts of the Pacific coast, for in this district five county inspectors and an expert from the department of agriculture are on duty all the time enforcing the state fruit pest laws and the quarantine inspection of trees and other nursery stock that is shipped into the valley. It is the claim of the fruit growers that within the next five years the Rogue River valley will be practically free from fruit pests, and that with the rigid quarantine inspection that will be maintained, aided by the four ranges of mountains that entirely surround the valley, no new fruit pests will ever get into this district.
