## CALIFORNIA PEARS ARE ALL SHIPPED

No More Carlots to Go Forward and but Few in Small Shipments.

That the California Bartlett pear crop is entirely marketed is shown by the weekly trade letter issued by the California Fruit Distributors under the date of August 17. They say: Pears—200 cars. Bartlett pears are no longer quotable in straight carlots, but it will be possible to include a few boxes in mixed orders for a few days to come.

The following gives a number of cars of deciduous fruit shipped to all points by all members of this company for the week (seven days) ending Monday night, August 16, 1909:

Plums and prunes—99 cars. As indicated in our last report, shipment of plums has decreased materially and after this week there will be a further marked decline.

Peaches—433 cars. Shipment of Elbertas, Susquehannas and other ed. Some fine Yellow Clings are now freestone peaches is almost next available and beginning with next week a limited number of cars of Salways will be offered. The crop of Salway peaches is materially lighter than last year and will probably not run more than 25 to 30 per cent of last year's output.

Grapes—222 cars. Grapes are now moving in considerable quantity and from this time on will be available as wanted. The movement at present consists of Malagas and Rose De Peru mostly. Some straight carloads of Tokays will move to auction points this week and next week we should be able to quote them to the f. o. b. trade. The weather has continued very favorable for grape development. The fruit is filling out nicely and taking on color rapidly. From president indications the crop will be not only liberal in quantity but of desirable quality.
