CONDITION OF THE ENGLISH APPLE CROP

London Fruit Importers Issue Trade Letter Dealing With Apples.

Woodall & Co., fruit importers of London, have issued the following trade letter regarding apples in the United Kingdom:

We again have the pleasure in giving the figures of the apple crop in the United Kingdom, from which it will be seen the crop is very large, and fully equal to that of last year.

The total imports from the United States and Canada during the past season were 1,539,192 barrels, as compared with 2,320,000 in 1907-8, and 2,089,000 in 1906-7.

Of last season's receipts 1,539,192 barrels, 671,389 barrels were received into Liverpool.

During the second season, which ended in April, the quantity landed in Liverpool was 201,384 barrels.

Consequent on the shortage, a very large quantity of boxes were received from California, where the crops were good, and receipts to Liverpool amounted to 240,100 boxes, against 108,721 boxes. These are reckoned in our statistics at three to a barrel. The season generally cannot be considered to have been satisfactory, as with the reduced receipts a higher range of prices might have been expected. This was mostly caused by the poor quality of the fruit, and much second quality was shipped, which, as so often stated, does not fill requirements, however great the scarcity. First arrivals in late August and during September landed in wretched condition, especially Canadian, caused by the abnormally hot weather at time of shipment; and notwithstanding stated scarcity, arrivals in the middle of October were 21,000 barrels in excess of previous season. After this, there was a great improvement both in quality and condition in a good demand at improved prices. Maines being especially attractive; this continued till the end of the month. Hudson River fruit was conspicuous by its absence, and continued so throughout. The shortage in early November became noticeable, being about 50,000 barrels less than previous season. Nova Scotians were arriving in good condition and quality, and, being a large crop, helped to fill the deficit from other sources. Altogether, shipments left much to be desired, a large proportion with exceptional instances being poor and wasty, making a wide range of prices, owing to the extraordinary variation in quality and condition. At the end of the month the decrease in receipts was 123,290 barrels, and at the end of December was over 213,000 barrels. Notwithstanding this the range of prices was not high, from the above-mentioned causes. During the spring some very good sales were realized, which are shown in diagram enclosed.

The outlook for early shipments is again only moderate. The best varieties will do well if landed in sound condition, but ordinary will be interfered with by the English crop should present prospects be realized. It can only be reported that good American and Canadian apples take command of the market as soon as obtainable.
