The men are Tony Williams, Yamhill county, forger, year and a half; Fred Reisington, Washington county, larceny, year and a half; Frank Weyer, Gilliam county, larceny, year; Clark Davis, Columbia county, larceny, year and a half. 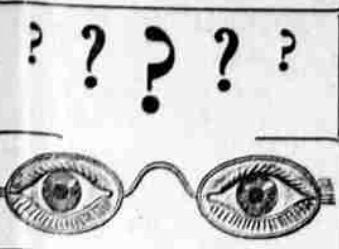

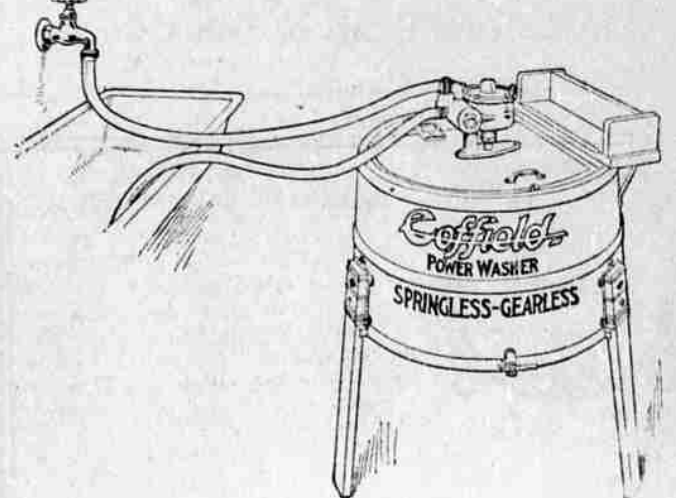
