BARTLETTS BRING SPLENDID PRICES

Rogue River Peaches Bring Highest Prices in Portland Markets.

The general range of prices in eastern markets was as follows at Saturday's sales for Bartletts:

- New York—\$2.85 to \$3. Boston—\$2.75. Philadelphia—\$2.60. Pittsburgh—\$2.65 to \$2.80. Rae & Hatfield under date of August 17, say:

Very favorable weather still prevailed. Cold and rainy. Large attendance at sale.

Weather conditions did not seem to have much effect on the trade today, prices being strong on all varieties. The trade at present are practically dependent on California fruit. Many of the Bartletts ripe. Ours averaging \$2.51.

Peaches—Strong. Elbertas averaging 90c, Crawford 76c, Yellow Pines 60c, Susquehanna 70c, Tuscan \$1.

Seedless averaged \$1.05, Tokays \$1.74, many showing nasty, Kelseys \$1.81, Gros \$1.23, Golden Drops 82c, Imperials 82c.

Expect our offering here tomorrow will be ten cents.

Our Recapitulation.

Oregon Journal: It begins to look as if the price of peaches will not reach a very low point the present season for good quality. Best peaches are selling today as high as \$1.20 a box, while some very good fruit is selling at \$1 to \$1.10. The general run of supplies ranges around 90c to \$1 per box, but buyers are eager purchasers at all ranges. Some California stock is still coming forward, but the southern Oregon product is far the best and brings the best values. That from the Rogue river brings a premium of 10c a box over anything offered. The reason for this is the uniform good quality of the arrivals and the most regular pack. Some very good fruit is coming from the Roseburg country and sells up to \$1.10, but to get this price quality must be better than the average.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—For the first time in history, the South Pacific ocean has been portrayed in a pilot chart, issued by the navy department hydrographic office. This quarterly chart, issued first today, combines features that sea captains heretofore have had to seek in books. The chart gives information relating to the trade winds, currents and everything pertaining to mariners.
