ASHLAND PEACHES FIND GOOD DEMAND

Straight Car of Fancy Oregon Crawford's Placed on Portland Market.

(The Telegram.)

Fancy Crawford peaches from the Ashland district were quoted firm at \$1 to \$1.10 a box today, and that the best fruit will go to \$1.20 or \$1.25 before the end of the week is the belief of some dealers.

The public need not look for the low prices at which Oregon peaches moved last year. The crop in this state and Washington this season is light as compared with that of 1908, and the market as a result is largely in the growers' hands.

The first straight car of Ashlands received here this season was put on the market by the W. B. Glafie company today, and the fruit went rapidly at the prices named.

A member of the Glafie firm said today that as a result of the unusual demand for Oregon peaches in the Sound markets there would probably not be more than five or six cars of Ashland Crawford's all told available for the local trade this season.

Stock Moving in Klamath.

Stock buyers are now in the Klamath country and numerous beef sales are being made. Cattle are in good condition and the season will prove a harvest for all who have beef cattle for sale.

The hay crop is being harvested, and as soon as it is finished stockmen will begin to buy. It is now stated that alfalfa will probably sell at \$7 a ton.

In addition to the shipments of Klamath county stock, the beef cattle from Lake county are being brought in. Several thousand head will be loaded loaded on the cars at Midland in the next few weeks.
