The branch is less than four feet long and has nearly, if not quite, 200 full grown prunes but so densely is the fruit packed around the branch that it is almost impossible to count them accurately. Mr. Dean has one of the finest locations in the valley, the home having been in the Dean family for more than fifty years.

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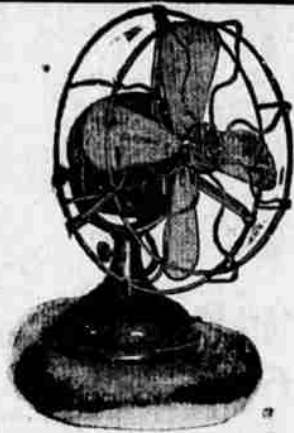
