SEATTLE, Aug. 30.—Fifty of the commercial experts of Japan are now the guests of the United States, having come to this country as guests of the Associated Chambers of the Pacific coast. They reached Seattle on the steamship Minnesota this week and will tour the country for three months inspecting trade conditions. They bring a special message of good will from the mikado, with instructions to cement the friendship between the two nations. One object of the visit is to enlarge the trade relations. Their coming gives the United States an opportunity to tighten its grip on the trade of the orient.
