Sgobel & Day, fruit brokers of New York, have the following to say regarding Bartlett pears under date of August 25:

Bartletts—Decreasing arrivals daily. Californians all colored. Best today from Winters, \$3.75 to \$3.50. First car of the season from the northwest we sold today. Fine fruit, well packed, and taken lively, especially owing to its being mostly 135 and 150 pears per box. Another car from Medford we shall sell on Friday. We cannot too strongly impress upon you the fact that Bartlett pears and others are going to sell very high, and if you have not sold we urge you not to do so, but to ship them. Ordinary Clapp's Favorites from up the river sold here yesterday at \$7.50 per barrel, and there are few Bartletts obtainable. Keep your pears for New York.

In regard to pears they say:  
Prunes—A few Fellebergs (Italian) sold today at \$1.75. Everybody asking for them. Early next week we shall sell two or three cars from Walla Walla, The Dalles and Mosier, and we confidently look for good money. We know of heavy sales f. o. b. Oregon and Washington, which will materially decrease the small receipts expected here, and there is nothing to prevent high prices on good Italians and Hungarians through the campaign. Do not sell them, but send them forward.
