FIRST DAYS WORK; FIRST COURT TERM

Interesting Account of First Court Proceedings Ever Held in Jackson County.

A copy of the journal of the first day's proceedings of the first term of court ever held in Jackson county may not prove uninteresting. It is taken verbatim et literatim from the records of the county clerk's office. Journal of the U. S. District Court Be it remembered that a District Court of the United States, for the Territory of Oregon, and County of Jackson, began and holden at the Town of Jacksonville, in said county, on Monday, the fifth day September, A. D. 1853. At which were present, The Hon. M. P. Deady, Judge L. Ter. Pros. Atty. Jos. W. Drew, Esq. F. Grover Esq., United States Dist. Atty. Pro Tem, Columbus Sims, Esq. Dept. Marshall, Mathew G. Kennedy, Sheriff, Edward Shiel Esq. District Clerk.

The following proceedings were had to wit:

And now at this day comes into court Nathaniel C. Deane, Andrew J. Butler, Ruppel B. Morford, William U. Fowler, Clark Rodgers, Samuel Colver, Aaron Chambers, Daniel Clinton, Abel Tenbrook, John C. Anderson, Eber Emery, John B. Waggoner, fifteen in number, good and lawful men of the county, in obedience to the command of the Venire heretofore opened by the Clerk for a Grand Jury, and it appearing to the court that less than a quorum of the regular panel of Grand Jurors is present, the Sheriff is ordered to summons from the bystanders seven talesmen whereupon came T. B. Sanderson, A. Little, John Penneger, William Kaylor, Chaney Nye, David Birdseye, and A. G. Snyder, seven in number good and lawful men of the county, who together with the fifteen Jurors aforesaid, after the appointment of William U. Fowler as foreman, were duly impaneled, sworn and charged as a Grand Jury to enquire into offenses for the body of the county of Jackson as well as on behalf of the United States as the Territory of Oregon. And now at this day upon good cause shown it is ordered by the court that Isaac Constant, J. C. Tolman, John E. Rap, Alonso A. Skinner, Levi A. Rice, Abel George and John Lamerick, heretofore summoned as Grand Jurors for this term be excused from such service.

And now at this day it is ordered by the court that the clerk of this court open a summons commanding Joseph Unthank to appear at the next term of this court, and show cause why he should not be fined for failing to appear at the present term of this court to serve as a grand juror in obedience to the venire heretofore served upon him for that purpose.

B. F. Harding Esq., attorney for the United States, not being present, and the said Dist. Atty. having recommended to the court the appointment of L. T. Grover, Esq., it is ordered by the court that said Grover be appointed District Atty. for the United States pro tem.

Whereupon Court adjourned.

JACKSON PIONEER IS VISITING CITY

"Courthouse Builder" Bob Cook, Is Spending a Few Days In Medford With Relatives.

Robert A. Cook, better known throughout the length and breadth of Jackson county as "Courthouse Builder" Bob Cook, is spending a few days in Medford with relatives, before returning to Grants Pass, where he is making his home at present with his daughter, although he is a resident of Footh Creek, where he is postmaster.

Mr. Cook arrived in the Rogue River valley for the first time on June 20, 1859, after a trip across the plains. Since then he has resided in this county. He gained his title as "courthouse builder" in the early 80s for it was due to his efforts as county commissioner that a much larger building was erected than was at that time deemed necessary, his faith in the ultimate growth of county business being more than justified since.

Many an old-timer in the county figures in the tales of early days that Bob Cook can tell of. He was active throughout his prime in county affairs. He has been on the books of the Jacksonville Times and Southern Oregonian for over 40 years.

Mr. Cook has been visiting his brother, Samuel Cook, on the Applegate for the past few days. He is a type of the sturdy old pioneers who figured so largely in building up the Oregon of today.

A Big Birdcage.

CLEARING UP LAND TITLES IN KLAMATH

Special Agents of State Endeavoring to Effect Adjustment of Titles to Land About Lakes.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Sept. 1.—H. P. Jones, a special agent of the general land office, and Peter Ogden Applegate, state land agent, arrived from Salem recently to inspect some lands about the lakes the titles of which are in question between the state and the United States.

The greater part of the lands in this section have long since been classified, either as government or as belonging to the state under the swamp land grant of March 12, 1860, but there are some odds and ends still undetermined. The classification of these becomes very important, since the Klamath Basin is now coming into its own and the rich alluvial lands about the lakes will soon be in great demand.

Messrs. Applegate and Jones went up the Klamath lake by launch to begin their examination of the low lands at the head of the lake, and will probably spend several days in their investigations.

SPOKANE OFFERS \$100,000 FOR AVIATION CONTEST

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 1.—The Spokane chamber of commerce will offer the Aero club of America \$100,000 for cash prizes to the aviators and will guarantee suitable grounds for international aviation contests, which are to be held next year in America. The commercial organization of Spokane will communicate with A. Holland Forbes at once relative to securing the contest for next year, and will endeavor to meet every requirement asked by Mr. Forbes.
