The following gives number of cars of deciduous fruit shipped to all points by all members of this company for the week ending Monday night, August 30:

Plums and prunes-43 cars. But few cars of this variety are going dozen; pumpkins, 10@15c. forward and shipments will soon altogether cease.

Peaches-155 cars. Shipment of Salways is increasing, but rather slowly, as the crop is not ripening as fast as had been expected. Previous predictions of light yield of this variety of fruit are being verified by conditions as they develop from day to day. It is doubtful if the output will be over 25 per cent as much as

Pears-113 cars. The amount of winter pears available is very limited and the few that we have to offer are being taken by the trade as fast as we can secure them. As there will not be enough of these pears to go around, all dealers desiring same are advised to place their orders at once.

Grapes -374 cars. The grape movement is now in full swing. Tokays are going forward from the principal table grape sections and shipments will continue in large volume until the close of the season. The quality of the fruit is very good and the trade can place their orders for this fruit with the certainty of getting a perfeetly satisfactory article. As the shipment of Toknys increases that of Malagas will gradually drop off until they are entirely out of the market. A few cars of Tokays from Florin have already sold in the anction markets and have brought exceptionally high prices. We advise the trade to place orders for Toknys now and get started on this popular fruit, which will be in plentiful supply during the season and will be a leader wherever grapes are consumed. Weather has been favorable, adverse conditions of every kind being entirely absent. Practically no mildew is to be found in the vineyards this year.
